# **1997 Birth Statistics Summary**

An update from the Vital Statistics Unit

The Health Statistics Section is pleased to present a summary of the 1997 Colorado birth data prior to the release of the comprehensive set of birth statistics published annually in the Colorado Vital Statistics report. Birth data are presented for the state overall and by county for all 1997 Colorado resident births regardless of whether births occurred within the state.

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#### **Trends**

The number of Colorado resident births increased from to 55,779 in 1996 to 56,505 in 1997. The Colorado birth rate continued declining in Colorado to 14.4 births per 1,000 resident population, slightly lower than the rate of 14.5 reported in 1996. Colorado's general fertility rate (the number of live births per 1,000 women age 15-44) increased only slightly in 1997 to 61.9, compared to 61.8 in 1996.

#### Age of Mother

The youngest mothers, aged 10-14, experienced a decrease in fertility rates from .9 births per 1,000 in 1996 to .7 in 1997. Decreases in the past two years were the first since 1988. Fertility rates for teens aged 15-17 remained at 30.9 births per 1,000 females for the second straight year, the lowest rate reported since 1989. The fertility rate for teens aged 18-19 decreased from 71.7 in 1996 to 70.0 in 1997. Rates for all mothers under 25 have been declining since 1992. Women between 25 and 44 experienced higher fertility rates in 1997 than in 1996. Fertility rates for women age 25-29 increased to 120.7 in 1997, up from 118.9 in 1996, and rates for mothers age 30-34 increased from 83.3 in 1996 to 85.2 in 1997. #### Race/Ethnicity of Mother

White/Hispanics continued to experience the highest general fertility rate at 103.4 births per 1,000 white/ Hispanic females age 15-44 in 1997. White/non-Hispanics had the lowest general fertility rate at 54.1. See page 2 for fertility rates by other race/ethnicity groups.

Among white/non-Hispanic and Asian females the highest fertility rates were experienced by those aged 20-29. Among white/Hispanics, blacks, and American Indians the highest fertility rates were reported for those aged 18-19.

#### **Birth Weight**

Low weight birth has been associated with infant morbidity and infant mortality<sup>1</sup>. In 1997, there were 5,014 low-weight births (<2,500 grams) or 8.9 percent of total Colorado resident births. This percentage is the same as reported in 1996, representing for the second year the highest proportion of low weight births since

1975. The percentage of very low weight births (<1500 grams) was 1.3 percent in 1997, the same as in 1996.

#### **Prenatal Care**

The Healthy People 2000 Objectives set forth by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services define late prenatal care as care that begins after the first trimester. In 1997, 17.1 percent of Colorado mothers began care after the first trimester (or not at all), down from the 18.6 percent reported in 1996.

#### **Gestational Age**

Preterm birth (<37 weeks gestation) is the leading cause of infant mortality in the U.S. In 1997, 8.6 percent of Colorado births were preterm, a decrease from 9.0 percent in 1996. Mothers in the age groups 10-17 and 18-19 experienced the highest percentage of preterm births, at 10.7 and 9.3 respectively.

#### Cigarette Smoking

Smoking cigarettes during pregnancy has been associated with various unwanted birth outcomes including low weight and preterm birth<sup>1</sup>. Of the Colorado resident births in 1997, 10.6 percent of the mothers reported smoking during pregnancy, down from the 12.1 percent in 1996. Reports of smoking during pregnancy decreased across all age groups.

#### **Education of Mother**

There were 10,570, or 18.9 percent of births in 1997, to mothers with fewer than 12 years of education. This percentage is slightly higher than the 18.7 percent reported in 1996.

#### **Marital Status**

The percent of all Colorado resident births to unmarried mothers increased from 24.8 percent in 1996 to 25.2 percent in 1997.

# Most Popular Baby Names in Colorado for 1997

he Health Statistics Section of the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment has compiled the list of the top 50 baby names for 1997 (see accompanying list). For baby boys, there were no changes in the top two names from 1996. Jacob remains in the top spot, followed by Michael. For baby girls, Hannah moved from number two to number one, switching places with Emily.

For girls, the names Jessica and Sarah remained in third and fourth place respectively. For baby boys, Matthew moved up from fourth position to third, and Joshua moved from fifth to fourth position.

Compared with the 1996 list, Kaitlyn, Allison, Marissa, and Mackenzie are new to the top 50 list of girls' names. For boys, the new names are Adam, Jack, Cole, Trevor, Ethan, and Ian.

Compared with 1987, there have been significant changes to the 50 most popular names for girls. Over the last decade, popular names like Christina/e, Heather, Amy, Melissa, and Michelle were replaced with Madison, Taylor, Alyssa, Alexis, and Emma. For 1997, 26 of the 50 names were different from the 1987 list. Traditional names like Mary, Lisa, and Andrea were on the list in 1987, but in 1997, they were replaced by Sierra, Gabrielle, and Savannah.

For boys, the changes were not as dramatic. Compared with 1987, 15 of the 50 most popular names changed in 1997. Brian, Steven, Timothy, Jeremy, and Jeffrey were replaced by Dylan, Christian, Connor, Cameron, and Noah. Mark, Patrick, and Paul were among the top 50 names in 1987, while Caleb, Logan, and Ian were popular in 1997.

Favorite baby names varied for different race/ethnicity groups in Colorado. White/non-Hispanics chose Hannah and Jacob as the top names in 1997. Jessica and Jose were the most common names for Hispanics, and Jasmine and Isaiah were the number one choices among blacks.

Names that didn't make the top fifty included Elway, Jamaica, and Mars for baby boys, and October, November, Paradise, and Rejoice for baby girls. □
