2009 Health Disparity Fact Sheet Hispanics/Latinos in Colorado



This fact sheet provides information about some of the major health indicators for the Hispanic/Latino population in Colorado. Like other communities of color, Hispanics/Latinos experience some differences in health, risk factors and behaviors in comparison to other population groups. The data presented show comparisons between the Hispanic/Latino population and the State's population as a whole and identifies where there are differences. The disparity column shows if the Hispanic/Latino rate is statistically worse (red), better (green) or the same (white) as the state rate. If it is the same, that means there is no statistically significant difference.

There are nearly 840,000 Hispanics/Latinos in Colorado. They make up almost 18% of the population and are the largest racial/ethnic minority group in the State. (2007 data, State Demography Office, Colorado Department of Local Affairs)

- The median household income for Hispanics/Latinos is \$16,074 less than the state median.
- Twice as many Hispanics/Latinos are living below the poverty level than the overall state population.
- Fewer Hispanics/Latinos graduate from high school than the state's population as a whole.

- Infant death and low weight births are similar to the population as a whole.
- Almost half of Latina births are from unplanned pregnancies.
- The Latina teen birth rate is 3 times higher than the state rate.
- Latinas are less likely to drink or smoke during pregnancy, but report the same amount of stress as other women.
- Hispanic/Latino children are almost twice as likely to be obese.

Hispanics/Latinos are more likely to exhibit risk behaviors than the State's population as a whole. They are:

- More likely to smoke and engage in binge drinking.
- Less likely to participate in any kind of physical activity or eat five or more fruits and vegetables a day.
- More likely to be overweight or obese.
- More likely to experience more than one week a month of poor mental health in the last month.

- More than twice as many Hispanics/Latinos are uninsured than Coloradans as a whole.
- Latinas are less likely to have had a mammogram, but just as likely to have had a pap test.
- Fewer Hispanics/Latinos have been told by a doctor that they have high blood pressure.
- More Hispanics/Latinos have diabetes, but fewer have asthma than the total State population.

- The top two leading causes of death, cancer and heart disease, are the same for Hispanics/Latinos as they are for the State's population as a whole. Diabetes is ranked fifth for Hispanics/Latinos, but 8th for the State. Chronic liver disease and kidney disease are in the top 10 causes of death for Hispanics/Latinos, but not for the state as a whole. Suicide and atherosclerosis is in the top 10 for the state, but not for the Hispanic/Latino population.
