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**A LISTING OF STATEWIDE INITIATED AND REFERRED
BALLOT PROPOSALS IN COLORADO
1912-2001**

This paper lists the statewide ballot measures, initiated and referred, in Colorado since 1912, the first election after the initiative and referendum were adopted. The information is provided by topic and year, whether the proposals were initiated by the people, referred by the General Assembly, referred by the people challenging an act of the General Assembly (shown as R*), and the vote on each measure.

A few comments are offered concerning this information:

- This issue brief lists the 327 statewide proposals that have been on Colorado ballots from 1912 through the 2001 election.
- Of the 327 ballot proposals, 179 were initiated by the people (55%), 135 were referred by the General Assembly (41%), and 13 (4%) were referred by the people challenging an act of the General Assembly.
- The average number of proposals on the ballots in the 45 general elections - even year elections - since 1912 is 7 per election. In recent general elections, the numbers have been higher than average. There were 13 in 1992, 12 in 1996 and 2000, and 11 each in 1994 and 1998.
- Of the many interesting topics on the ballots, financing of highway construction is one of the most enduring. There were three road-related proposals presented in 1912; one each in 1914, 1922, 1926, and 1934; two in 1920; and closer to the present, one each in 1997 and 1999, plus a "fixed guideway" proposal in 2001. There were five measures relating to prohibition between 1912 and 1932. There has been at least one proposal on the ballot in even-numbered year elections since 1912, with the 1930 and 1942 elections each having only one proposal. Odd-numbered year elections under the Taxpayer's Bill of Rights began in 1993 and TABOR proposals were voted on in 1993, 1995, 1997, 1999, and 2001. The largest number of

proposals at one election was in 1912 with 32 measures on the ballot.
