Families of youth in the care of the Colorado Division of Youth Corrections are encouraged to visit the facility. All visits require a scheduled appointment. You can request visitation by contacting the Platte Valley Youth Services Center Control Unit at (970) 304-6220.

Visitation Hours >>>

Monday-Sunday 9am-9pm No personal visits Wednesday from 5pm-9pm except as approved. Professional visits scheduled as needed.

Youth have the opportunity for a minimum 30-minute visit per week. The number of visits per month can be increased by progress made in treatment and level system advancement.

The standard length of a visit is 30 minutes. Longer visits may be approved. For visitors traveling more than 50 miles, a one-hour visit is granted.
