


Population

Population Estimates and Forecasts for the resident population are produced by the State Demography Office.

- Cheyenne Wells saw a sharp decline in population from 1991 through 2009.
- Since 2009, the population has remained relatively steady.
- The population declines are related to out migration and aging leading to a decrease in family households.

Cheyenne Wells Population, 1990 to 2014




Population By Age

Cheyenne Wells' population by age is shown in the chart to the right for both 2000 (darker bar) and 2010 (lighter bar). The largest increase was in the 55 to 64 year old age group. Declines in the young adult and children age groups mean there are fewer families with children.



Population By Age, Continued

Cheyenne County is expected to increase slowly between 2015 and 2025. Most of this growth is forecast in the prime working age adults (40-49) and those over 70 years of age. In-migration to the county will be driven by the need for replacement workers for older adults aging out of Cheyenne County's current labor force. Due to the forecast growth in working age adults, there is also a forecast growth in the number of older children and teens. This growth will not negate the need to evaluate aging services, but may alleviate some of the downward pressure aging can put on tax revenues



- The overall vacancy rate was only 11% in 2010.
- Most of the units are owner occupied (72%) but an active rental market exists as well.

- The number of households in Cheyenne Wells declined between 2000 and 2010.
- The decline was entirely of family households while nonfamily households and households living alone increased during the decade.
- The increase in nonfamily households was consistent with many other Colorado communities experiencing similar age growth.




Income

The graph below compares Cheyenne Well's income distribution to the state. Cheyenne Wells has a lower median household income than the state, \$40,521 vs. \$59,448. Cheyenne Wells has a larger share of people earning less than \$40,000 than the state. The income distribution is likely influenced by lower wage jobs for residents and residents on fixed incomes.



Education

Cheyenne Wells has a lower share of its population with a bachelor's degree or higher compared to the state and county. The largest share of the population has some college or associate's degree. The share of residents who have graduated from high school is higher than the state, but the population of high school drop outs is also.




Commuting

Communiting plays an important role in the economy of an area because not all workers live where they work. Commuting impacts local job growth, access to employees, and transportation infrastructure.

The large green circle represents the jobs, the light green the labor force and where they intersect is where the local jobs are filled by the local labor force. About 20% of the jobs are held by residents and 80% of the jobs are held by people who live outside the city. Considering Cheyenne Wells' labor force, about 28% work in town and 72% are employed outside of the city limits.

Cheyenne Wells Commuting Patterns, 2014



Jobs & the Economy

Total employment in the county was estimated to be 1,225 in 2014. Cheyenne County has lost 37 jobs since 2011. As shown in the time series at right, 14 jobs were gained in 2014. The largest shares of job gains have been in agriculture followed by accommodation and food services, and administrative and waste services.

Economic Industry Mix

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Cheyenne Wells has a similar industry mix to Cheyenne County, except it has less agriculture jobs and more in government, as seen in the chart at left. The largest industries by employment share of jobs are Government, Mining, Retail Trade, and Wholesale Trade. The larger share of jobs in Government than the county is commonly seen in towns that serve as the county seat.



Average Wage Trends

- Average weekly wages in Cheyenne Wells increased 18% from 2010 to 2015.
- Cheyenne County saw wage growth of 19% over the same five year period.
- Weekly wages of \$792 in Cheyenne Wells in 2015 were only 76% of the \$1,042 statewide average; the weekly wage was 104% of the \$761 Cheyenne County average.

Economic Base Analysis

The Base Industries chart shows which industries drive the economy in Cheyenne. The chart shows the important share of economic activity driven by agriculture. Mining, regional services, and retirees are also very important to the economy. Regional service includes all establishments primarily engaged in providing services to surrounding counties or to the nation. Examples of which in Cheyenne County include wholesale trade and transportation and warehousing.



Population and Economic Forecast

The rates of growth of both population and jobs can differ somewhat because of changes in the labor market, i.e., labor force participation rates, age, unemployment rates, multiple job holding, and/or commuting. In addition, macroeconomic conditions such as business cycle fluctuations and faster or slower periods of U.S. and Colorado economic growth can affect overall job growth in a region.

- Job and population growth are both expected to be moderate from 2015 to 2030.
- Growth in the number of jobs is expected to be larger than the growth in the population as commuters from other counties will continue to fill many of the jobs.
- The county might consider how to attract and retain more prime working age households (age 30 to 44) while balancing the needs of the current population.
