

Population Estimates and Forecasts for the resident population are produced by the State Demography Office.


- Archuleta County's population grew rapidly in the 1990s and early 2000s, outpacing the state.
- Since 2007, Archuleta's population growth rates have leveled out and are slower than the state as a whole. This change is largely due to an aging population and an increase in nonfamily households.
- Population figures do not reflect the large number of seasonal visitors, many of whom own 2nd homes in the area.


Population By Age

Archuleta's population by age is shown in the chart to the right for both 2000 (darker bar) and 2010 (lighter bar). Age groups 45 and over, especially 55 and over, experienced a large increase from 2000 to 2010. Slowed growth in the younger age groups are the result of net out-migration of young adults. The aging population may put downward pressure on local government tax revenue due to changes in spending on taxable goods.



Population By Age, Continued

Archuleta is forecast to reach 13,778 by 2020 and 23,112 by 2040. Most of the growth is forecast for residents over age 70, the result of current older residents aging in place. The aging of current county residents will also cause a decline in the number of residents ages 50 to 59 since there are fewer 40-49 year olds, an important age group as they are also typically the households with the highest income. The forecast growth will be dependent on housing and community services and how well Archuleta attracts and retains its population.



- The overall vacancy rate was nearly 40% in 2010.
- The majority of vacant units are for seasonal use (67.6%).
 - Most of the units are owner occupied (74.9%) but an active rental market exists as well

- There was an increase in households between 2000 and 2010.
- This increase was seen in both family and nonfamily households with the exception of family households with children under 18.
- This data is consistent with the aging of Archuleta county residents.



- Archuleta County is less diverse than the state as a whole but is becoming more diverse
 over time.
- The Hispanic population increased by 30% between 2000 and 2010, while the White population increased by 19%. The total population increase over that same period was 22%.


Income

The graph below compares Archuleta's income distribution to the state. Archuleta has a lower median household income than the state, \$48,186 vs. \$59,448. Looking at the income distribution, there is a higher share of households with less than \$40,000 in income compared to the state. This is likely driven by the large share of retail, government, and accommodation and food services jobs and larger share of retirees.



Education

- Archuleta has about the same share of its population with a bachelor's degree or higher than the state.
- The largest share of the population has some college or assoicates degree.




Commuting

Commuting plays an important role in the economy of an area because not all workers live where they work. Commuting impacts local job growth, access to employees, and transportation infrastructure.

More than 70% of the jobs (dark green) are held by residents and 29% of the jobs are held by people who live in another county. Considering Archuleta's labor force, 39% travel outside of the county for employment while 61% work in the county.

Jobs & the Economy

Total employment in the county was estimated to be 6,255 in 2015, down 120 jobs from Archuleta's peak employment in 2007 of 6,375. The industries with the largest loss in jobs in during the recession were construction, retail trade, accommodation and food, and real estate. Since 2010 the fastest growth in jobs has been in health services and retail trade. Industries above their pre-recession peak include agriculture, manufacturing, transportation, health services, and government.



Archuleta Base Industries, 2014





Economic Base Analysis

The Base Industries chart shows which industries drive the economy in Archuleta. The chart shows the important share of economic activity driven by tourism (including seasonal home use) and retiree spending. Retirees are a driver because they spend their savings or pensions locally. Regional services (like construction), agriculture, and other household spending are also important economic drivers to the county.

Average Wage Trends

- Average weekly wages in Archuleta increased by 8.5% between 2010 and 2015 compared to the state which increased by 13.3%.
- Weekly wages of \$626 in Archuleta in 2015 were 60% of the \$1,042 statewide average.
- Wages in Archuleta are more volatile than statewide due to the small employment base.
 Wages increased by 1.6% in 2015 vs. 2.8% statewide; this slower gain is attributable to a substantial increase in lower paying retail jobs.



Population and Economic Forecast

The rates of growth of both population and jobs can differ somewhat because of changes in the labor market, i.e., labor force participation rates, age, unemployment rates, multiple job holding, and/or commuting. In addition, macroeconomic conditions such as business cycle fluctuations and faster or slower periods of U.S. and Colorado economic growth can affect overall job growth in a region.

- Job growth exceeded population growth from 2010 to 2015. After 2015, population growth is expected to exceed job growth.
- Population growth after 2020 in Archuleta County is in part driven the need to replace retired workers within the labor force.
- This means that population will grow faster than employment. This may require additional housing and community services. Additionally, an aging population may require increased need for accessible housing and other aging services.
