### **Colorado Prevention Partners for Success (CPPS)**

Colorado is one of only four states to be awarded the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Partnership for Success: State and Community Prevention Performance grant. This program is designed to help reduce statewide substance abuse rates by addressing gaps in current prevention services and increasing the ability to reach out to specific populations or geographic areas with serious, emerging substance abuse problems. The other three states are Connecticut, Illinois, and Tennessee.

The Colorado Prevention Partnership for Success (CPPS) project employs a public health model to demonstrate positive statewide change to prevent the onset and reduce the progression of underage and binge drinking among Hispanic/Latino high school youth. The Division of Behavioral Health will be working with four counties: Adams, Denver, Pueblo, and Weld over the next five years.

### **Law Enforcement Assistance Fund (LEAF)**

The Law Enforcement Assistance Fund (LEAF) legislation allocates funds to the Colorado Department of Transportation and the Colorado Department of Human Services, Division of Behavioral Health (formerly the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division). Monies allocated to the Division of Behavioral Health (CRS 43-4-402) are used “to establish a statewide program for the prevention of driving after drinking, including educating the public in the problems of driving after drinking, training of teachers, health professionals, and law enforcement in the dangers of driving after drinking, preparing and disseminating educational materials dealing with the effects of alcohol and other drugs on driving behavior, and preparing and disseminating education curriculum materials for use at all levels of school.”

### **Persistent Drunk Driver (PDD)**

The Persistent Drunk Driver (PDD) Cash Fund was established July 1, 1998 by HB 98-1334, known as the “Persistent Drunk Driver Act of 1998”. The fund receives fees imposed on convicted Driving While Ability Impaired (DWAI) and Driving Under the Influence (DUI) offenders. The fees are assessed in the form of an additional penalty surcharge

collected by the county courts and forwarded to the State Judicial Department where they are deposited in the PDD fund. The overall purpose of the fund as expressed in 42-3-303, C.R.S. is to:

- Pay for costs incurred by the Department of Revenue for implementation of certain portions of the act
- Support programs intended to deter persistent drunk driving
- Support education programs for the general public, with particular emphasis on the education of young drivers regarding the dangers of persistent drunk driving
- Pay the costs for required intervention and treatment services for a persistent drunk driver who is unable to pay for the required intervention or treatment services

The counties currently selected to receive Persistent Drunk Driver (PDD) funds were chosen by region based on combined rates of juvenile-alcohol related arrests and juvenile DUI's that were over 50% above the state average.

### **Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant Funds:**

The Colorado Division of Behavioral Health Community Prevention Programs (DBH Prevention) administers a portion of the Federal Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment (SAPT) Block Grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to implement substance use disorder prevention programs, practices and approaches within the state which align with federal and state prevention priorities. The federal block grant guidelines include primary prevention activities that are directed at individuals who do not require treatment for substance use and abuse. In implementing comprehensive primary prevention programs, a variety of strategies are utilized including but not limited to the six SAMHSA Center for Substance Abuse (CSAP) strategies listed: Information Dissemination, Education, Alternatives, Problem Identification and Referral, Community-based Process, and Environmental.

In conjunction with CSAPs promotion of priority populations for prevention programming that include children and youth under age 18; young adults age 18-25 years old, military and their families, older adults, among others. DBH Prevention has determined four priority areas for the prevention Block Grant funding with the goal of reaching individuals, families, schools, communities and larger systems. These funding areas are:

- Prevention and Reduction of Under Age 18 Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drug Use
- Changing Community Norms Regarding Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drug Use
- Addressing Population-based Needs Regarding Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drug Use
- State Priority Initiatives

By supporting these four priority areas in the deployment of effective, researched-based strategies within a comprehensive framework, DBH aims to promote programs, resources and services that together contribute to a healthy Colorado.

<i>Program Description</i>	<p>Recent gains made in curbing substance abuse by US youth suggest community based prevention programs have impact; however, much work remains to be done. Recent reports show that within Colorado, 32% reported having 5 or more drinks of alcohol in a row. As troubling, 29% of students reported that in the past month, they rode with a drinking driver and 11% said that they drove after drinking in the past month (1).</p> <p>These state rates are also reflected within Adams County, a county with a high Hispanic population. According to the Adams County Student Survey administered to all 6th through 12th graders in Adams County, in 2009 36% of students self-report having drank alcohol in the past 30 days while 82% of students believed that other students in their school had used alcohol in the same time period.</p> <p>The Adams County Prevention Partnership aims to reduce binge drinking among Hispanic youth across Adams County by leveraging a strong community based prevention infrastructure and building on the successes of existing programs. Using a community based, coalition approach and by incorporating CSAP's strategies of Information Dissemination, Education, Alternatives, Problem Identification and Referral, Community-based Process, Environmental, the project will have a significant impact on the rate of youth binge drinking within the County, and by extension, across the state.<sup>1</sup> The Costs and Effectiveness of Substance Use Disorder Programs in the State of Colorado, Report to the General Assembly House and Senate Committees On Health and Human Services October 31, 2010.</p>

<i>Program Description</i>	<p>Denver County will address the issue of underage and binge drinking among Hispanic/Latino high school youth via the Colorado Prevention Partners for Success (CPPS) grant. Our performance target is to reduce 30-day binge use among Hispanic/Latino high school youth by 5% after 3 years and 8% after 5 years. We are working through and revisiting steps of the Strategic Prevention Framework, specifically focusing on those neighborhoods and schools with a greater than 50 percent Latino population. We continue to engage our community coalition, the Denver Drug Strategy Commission (DDSC) which also serves as our Prevention Policy Board. General policy questions and concerns will be brought forth during DDSC meetings; for sector-specific policy concerns (e.g., regarding schools or law enforcement), individuals representing those sectors will be engaged in ad hoc meetings to develop specific recommendations. Building capacity and momentum in the community will also continue to be an ongoing goal with a specific focus on youth empowerment and youth advocacy. Program implementation will be guided by community needs and the CSAP prevention strategies such as information dissemination, prevention education (i.e. implementing evidence-based programs - The Strengthening Families Program), and environmental strategies (i.e. reducing youth access to alcohol).</p>

<i>Program Description</i>	<p>The Division of Behavioral Health established The Colorado Prevention Partnership for Success (CPPS) initiative to: reduce and prevent the onset, and reduce the progression of binge drinking among Hispanic/Latino high school youth in Colorado; strengthen capacity and infrastructure at State and community levels to support the prevention of binge drinking among Hispanic/Latino high school youth; and leverage, redirect and realign statewide funding streams for the prevention of binge drinking among Latino high school youth. Specifically, Colorado will reduce 30-day binge use among Latino high school youth by 5% after three years and 8% after five years, as measured by the Healthy Kids Colorado Survey. DBH subcontracts with OMNI Institute, a non-profit provider of social research, evaluation, training and TA to provide training and technical assistance to CPPS communities and to evaluate the initiative. Consultative teams of OMNI staff (evaluators, Regional Prevention Consultants and epidemiologists) support DBH and communities in meeting federal evaluation reporting requirements as well as successful implementation of steps 1-5 of the Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF).</p>
