The Colorado Division of Wildlife's Master Angler Award Program recognizes anglers who catch fish of trophy size and promotes the wise use and conservation of those trophy fish.

The award program has two categories – one for fish that are kept, and one for fish that are released. Anglers who qualify for an award must submit an application form that details the catch of the fish. Qualifying lengths for each species are listed in this brochure. The award program is based on lengths of fish rather than on weight, so that caught fish may be measured and released if desired.

Master Angler Record – For the Year – by Length (Released)



Colorado Master Angler Award


There are two categories for anglers to consider in the Master Angler Award Program. One category is for kept fish, the other is for released fish. There is a year-end award for released fish. Anglers who catch a fish of qualifying length will receive a Master Angler certificate and patch. Anglers who achieve record status will also receive a matching lapel pin. Only one patch per angler will be awarded each year. However, anglers may submit more than one entry and will receive a certificate for each accepted additional entry.

The Master Angler Program is designed to promote the conservation of

fishery resources and quality fishing by encouraging the careful release of trophy-size popular sport species. The program recognizes anglers for excellence in their sport as well.







Total Length

- **1.** Fish must be hooked, played, landed and/or released on sport tackle by the entrant. (Snagged fish are not eligible.)
- **2.** Only fish caught in Colorado are eligible for entry.
- **3.** All state fishing regulations must be followed.
- **4.** How to measure: Close fish's mouth and measure from the tip of jaw to the tip of the tail. This is the total length.
- **5.** Entries must be sent within 60 days of the fish being caught. A clear side-view photograph must accompany the entry with one witness verification. There must be two witnesses if no photograph is available.
