# Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., (January 15, 1929-April 4, 1968) was born in Atlanta, GA. His birth name was Michael King, Jr., but later had his name changed to Martin Luther King, Jr. King attended segregated public schools in Georgia, graduating from high school at the age of fifteen; he received the B. A. degree in 1948 from Morehouse College. After three years of theological study at Crozer Theological Seminary in Pennsylvania, where he was elected president of a predominantly white senior class, he was awarded the B.D. in 1951. With a fellowship from Crozer, he enrolled in graduate studies at Boston University, completing his residence for the doctorate in 1953 and receiving the degree in 1955. In Boston he met and married Coretta Scott, a young woman of uncommon intellectual and artistic attainments. Their marriage produced two sons and two daughters.

In 1954, Martin Luther King became pastor of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama. Always a strong advocate of civil rights for members of his race, King was, by this time, a member of the executive committee of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), the leading organization of its kind in the nation. He was ready then, early in December 1955, to lead the bus boycott of Montgomery, AL, the first great African American nonviolent demonstration of contemporary times in the United States. The boycott lasted 382 days. On December 21, 1956, the Supreme Court of the United States declared the laws requiring segregation on buses as unconstitutional. During the days of the boycott King was arrested, his home was bombed, and he was subjected to personal abuse, yet he emerged as a leader of the Civil Rights Movement.

In 1957, King was elected president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, an organization formed to provide new leadership for the now burgeoning Civil Rights Movement. During the eleven-year period between 1957 and 1968, King traveled over six million miles and spoke over twenty-five hundred times, appearing wherever there was injustice, protest, and action. During this time he wrote five books as well as numerous articles. In these years he led a massive protest in Birmingham, Alabama that caught the attention of the entire world, providing what he called a coalition of conscience and inspiring his "Letter from a Birmingham Jail", a manifesto of the African American revolution. He planned the drives in Alabama for the registration of Black voters and directed the peaceful march on Washington, D.C. of 250,000 people to whom he delivered his "I Have a Dream" address. He conferred with President John F. Kennedy and campaigned for President Lyndon B. Johnson; he was arrested upwards of twenty times and assaulted at least four times; he was awarded five honorary degrees; was named Man of the Year by *Time* magazine in 1963; and became not only the symbolic leader of African Americans but also a world figure.

At the age of thirty-five King was the youngest man to have received the Nobel Peace Prize. When notified of his selection, he announced that he would turn over the prize money of \$54,123 to the furtherance of the Civil Rights Movement.

On the evening of April 4, 1968, King was assinated while standing on the balcony of his motel room in Memphis, Tennessee, where he was to lead a protest marchwith striking sanitation workers.

# Day of Service Overview


In honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s dedication to community service and volunteerism, Congress passed an initiative in 1994 to dedicate the MLK, Jr. Holiday as a National Day of Service and encourages all Americans to give back to their communities.

# The MLK Jr. Marade

The Martin Luther King, Jr. Marade in Denver, CO is one of the largest MLK Day celebrations in the country. Over 30,000 Coloradoans participated in the 25<sup>th</sup> Annual Marade, making it the largest to date.

On Monday, January 18, 2010, 30,000 Coloradoans gathered at the Martin Luther King, Jr. statue in Denver's City Park to hear prayers, inspiring words, and influential speeches from Governor Bill Ritter Jr., Lt. Governor Barbara O'Brien, State House Speaker Terrance Carroll, Mayor John Hickenlooper, US Senators Mark Udall and Michael Bennet, State and City elected individuals, and other community leaders.

Following the ceremony, participants marched from the statue, down Colfax Ave., to Civic Center Park. A second ceremony took place at Civic Center Park to culminate the Marade and present special awards.

Hundreds of volunteers helped with the organization, promotion, setup, and security for the event. Martin Luther King, Jr. said, "Everyone can be great because everyone can serve." Through the volunteers, we saw these words come to life.

Volunteers packed boxes for the Haiti relief effort, cleaned wheelchairs, cleaned and replaced medical equipment, and built additional storage for the Project C.U.R.E. warehouse. Additionally, Kaiser volunteers helped sort and pack medical supplies, which will be sent to communities in need around the world. In total, the volunteers packed and labeled 437 cartons of medical supplies, packed 15 pallets for shipment to Haiti, and cleaned and prepared 75 pairs of crutches, 50 wheelchairs, and 12 biomedical machines.

Volunteers touched the lives of about 140 seniors through games, individual visits, and assisting with daily activities. During their lunch break, the volunteers created 20 cards and 20 care packages for the seniors they visited with that morning.



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#### Denver Bronco's Boys and Girls Club

In the morning, volunteers sorted 22 boxes of toys, organized the facility's storage room, organized the art room, and sorted 6 boxes of art supplies. The group replaced 1 basketball rim and 5 basketball nets. Additionally, they updated 5 bulletin boards,, and cooked and served lunch for the club's 80 youth and 7 staff members. In the afternoon, volunteers engaged the youth in table tennis, pool, card games, painting, jewelry making, art, and constructing birdhouses. The day ended with a group of Club members putting on a talent show for their peers and the volunteers.





### <u>Colorado Coalition for the Homeless</u>

Volunteers engaged in painting projects at the Stout Street Clinic and the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless' main office building. The volunteers painted several bathrooms, a kitchen/break room, a conference room, the family waiting area, an accent wall in the lobby, and more. The areas were painted in an array of new and inviting colors.

#### Metro Community Provider Network

Volunteers helped clean and paint the clinic. The clinic's 28 staff members and approximately 10,000 patients will appreciate the work of this volunteer day.



#### Food Bank of the Rockies

Volunteers packed 900 boxes of food, which will be delivered to food banks, shelters, and other hunger-relief organizations throughout Colorado and Wyoming.



#### **MLK Early College**

Volunteers painted 30 columns in the school's main atrium and added motivational stenciling to five of the columns. Several volunteers helped build, mount, and decorate 4 new bulletin boards to help teachers share important information with students. Volunteers cleaned and conditioned approximately 200 wooden doors, a project that DPS has been unable to complete due to time constraints. A group of volunteers sorted and reorganized thousands of books, which will allow teachers to now get the correct books in the hands of students.

The kids painted their hands and printed them on their paper mural as a pledge against using their hands for violence.

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#### Western Hardrock Watershed Team

AmeriCorps members from the CO Watershed Team and the Office of Surface Mining (OSM) joined the Coalition for the Upper South Platte (CUSP) and Help the Needy, a local non-profit from Teller County, to partake in their monthly firewood distribution day.

Logs that were removed during forest health projects had been delivered to the worksite at the Woodland Park Fire Department prior to the event. Chainsaw certified participants cut the logs into rounds. Other volunteers hauled the rounds to piles where they were then spilt with a wood splitter. These smaller, fireplace-sized pieces were stacked in neat piles to dry. While new pieces of firewood were being "created", other volunteers were loading truck beds and trailers with dry wood for local residents to take in order to heat their homes this winter. At the end of the workday, several volunteers loaded two other truck beds to deliver firewood to residents' homes.



#### **Partners in Routt County**

Partners in Routt County VISTAs, seven school-based mentors, and two Rocky Mountain Youth Corps VISTAs, coordinated a project to work with local youth and to give back to the community.

The city of Steamboat Springs has an after school and school days off program that they recognized as a group to work with, especially as school was not in session on MLK Day. During various activities, the kids played some gym games that emphasized teamwork and communication; made their own paper bag puppets and performed a skit with themes of diversity, and again, teamwork and communication; and made thank you cards for the various public servants of their community.

Volunteers then made brownies and cookies and delivered them, along with the thank you cards to the police station, fire stations, ski patrol, and the city's snowplow service.




#### **United Way of Weld County**

The Weld County AmeriCorps\*VISTAs helped with a Housing Assistance Fair in Greeley, CO as part of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service. Foreclosures in Weld County remain high and attendees seeking alternative options were able to speak directly to bank representatives, housing counselors, and other non-profit professionals.

Nine VISTA members helped register and guide attendees to various workshops including "Options When Facing Foreclosure," "How to Speak to Your Mortgage Lender," and "Surviving a Layoff." The VISTA team also helped guide people to fifteen different informational booths including: United Way of Weld County, 2-1-1, Chase Homeownership Center, Consumer Credit Counseling Service, Wells Fargo Bank, and the Colorado Foreclosure Hotline.

#### **Weld County Youth Conservation Corps**

WCYCC coordinated two service projects for the MLK Day of Service. # Project Angel Heart

Dedicated members of the Denver community founded Project Angel Heart in 1991. They were determined to ensure that those living with HIV/AIDS and other life-threatening illnesses were receiving proper nutrition - vital in the fight against disease. Project Angel Heart initially served twelve clients from a single, donated pan of lasagna. In 2009, Project Angel Heart delivered over 410,223 meals to 1,842 clients, free of charge. During eighteen years of phenomenal growth, their goal has always remained the same: 'meals with love' for men, women, and children living with life-threatening illnesses.

Project Angel Heart's delivery zone has expanded from 150 square miles of central Denver to encompass delivery boundaries that include 750 square miles of metropolitan Denver and 150 square miles in the Colorado Springs area. Such growth would not have been possible without the dedication of their volunteers. In 2008, 2,983 people donated 42,285 hours of their time preparing food in the kitchen, driving 42,952 miles to deliver meals to clients' homes, helping in the office, and assisting with fundraising events.

For over 800 clients served each week, Project Angel Heart embodies stability and hope by providing nutritious meals, free of charge, and specifically prepared to meet the nutritional needs of each individual client. Life-threatening illnesses can drain a person's energy and finances, threaten their dignity, limit their independence, and leave them feeling alone and vulnerable. Project Angel Heart provides life-saving nutrition necessary for physical, emotional, and financial health.



# Kids' Pasta Project

The mission of the Kids' Pasta Project is for youth to serve their community by preparing and serving freshly made, healthy meals with the profits going to local causes.

To honor MLK Day, KPP created its first annual "KPP Building Bridges Service Award" to present to one of these causes. Award applicants answered questions about how they strengthen community, empower individuals, and build bridges in the community. A committee of ten youth reviewed the applications and awarded the Paonia Library first place and the Tri-County Resource Council second place.

Volunteers arrived to prepare for the dinner at Scenic Mesa Ranch in Hotchkiss, CO on the afternoon of January 18. Area VISTAs came to help and talk with the ten KPP volunteers between the ages of seven and fifteen about Martin Luther King, Jr. Some of the volunteers worked in the kitchen rolling out fresh pasta, while others worked in the dining room as waiters, bus staff, cashier, and maitre d' serving approximately thirty guests.

Two of the youth wrote speeches about the recipient organizations and presented them at the dinner along with the prize checks. Another youth quoted from Martin Luther King, Jr.'s speech, "I have a dream that someday my four children will be judged not by the color of their skin but by the content of their character..." KPP teaches kids the purpose of this dream.





# Honoring MLK, Jr. Project

The assembly began with an introduction of who Martin Luther King was and the impacts he made on our nation. Next, a senior recited Martin Luther King, Jr.'s famous speech "I Have A Dream". The "I Have A Dream" speech contest consisted of students writing their own "I Have A Dream" speech. The top three winners of each contest presented their poems and speeches at the school assembly in honor of Martin Luther King, Jr. Winners were awarded cash prizes.

For the K-5<sup>th</sup> Grades a coloring contest was held. The coloring contest consisted of students coloring a portrait of Martin Luther King, Jr. Winners were selected as best colored page in each class. Winners were awarded McDonald's gift cards and given certificates by members of Students Taking Action Against Underage Drinking (STUD).

# Northern Ave. Clean Up


