# Overview of UCD

#### A premier research university

The University of Colorado Denver (UC Denver) is Colorado's premier research university.

The origins of this major institution began in 1883 with the creation of a medical department (consisting of two students and two senior faculty) by the University of Colorado. The College of Nursing was established in 1898. The School of Pharmacy was added in 1913, and the medical center at Ninth and Colorado was dedicated in 1925.

The Downtown Campus originated as an extension of the University of Colorado at Boulder in 1912, becoming a separate institution in 1972. In 2004, the University of Colorado at Denver combined with the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center.

The university is currently found at three different locations:

- Downtown Campus, with liberal arts and sciences and professional programs in seven schools and colleges
- Ninth Ave. and Colorado Blvd., now in the final stages of relocating all operations to
- Anschutz Medical Campus in Aurora, home for six professional schools in the health sciences, extensive research and education facilities and University of Colorado Hospital and patient care buildings

Downtown Campus culture reflects a history of service to upper division and graduate students. Downtown students have historically been older than the traditional 18-to-21-year-old student. They are generally working at least part-time (and many fulltime) and have significant family responsibilities.

The addition of residential housing adjacent to the Auraria campus has enabled a significant infusion of attention and focus to the lower division undergraduate student. A robust undergraduate experience is taking shape, including an appeal to high-achieving students through a University Honors and Leaders Program.

The Downtown Campus offers convenient access to businesses, organizations and government offices. Internships and class projects "in the field" enable students to gain hands-on, practical experience to complement their classroom learning.

Health sciences programs are highly selective. Clinical and research components are significant drivers of the university budget and economic impact.

The extensive new medical and research facilities at the Anschutz Medical Campus provide a cuttingedge environment for studies, patient care and research. When this development is complete, including the university programs as well as some affiliated hospitals and independent bioscience companies, it will be the most substantial health and research enterprise in the Rocky Mountain region.

#### A priority on diversity and inclusion

The university places a high priority on strengthening diversity and inclusion in its student and faculty programs.

The greatest diversity at UC Denver is found among staff and administrators, who are 27 percent minority and 64 percent female. Every faculty category has in the last year showed a slight increase in faculty-of-color representation.

Compared to Colorado's research universities, UC Denver has the most diverse student population: 28 percent of undergraduate students, 13 percent of graduate students and 21 percent of first professional students are students of color. Since fall 2006, enrollment for students of color has increased 4 percent. Five-year growth rates show the greatest increase came from African Americans, with 22 percent growth overall and 37 percent increase among undergraduates. International students comprise 4 percent of the total student population.

The **university enterprise contributes substantially** to Colorado's economy, through employment, purchase of goods and services and consumer spending by faculty, staff and students.

# Dean: Mark Gelernter, PhD, BArch

The state's only architecture school offers undergraduate programs for 832 students on the Boulder campus and graduate programs for more than 500 students in Denver. Programs are accredited by the Landscape Architecture Accreditation Board (LAAB), National Architecture Accrediting Board (NAAB) and Planning Accreditation Board (PAB).

As one of the country's largest colleges of architecture and related design and planning disciplines, the college is able to create a number of communities of interest across the disciplines, bringing together faculty, students and practitioners and building synergistic relationships. These communities of interest are creating areas of prominence and distinction for the college and include:

- · emerging practices in design
- sustainable urbanism
- · healthy environments
- · cultural heritage

Supporting these communities are centers that offer field experience:

- Center for Emerging Practices in Design exploring new design practices and technologies
- Center of Preservation Research—supporting historic preservation research projects
- Colorado Center for Sustainable Urbanism studying growth-oriented issues, disseminating information, testing growth scenarios and providing expertise to cities and organizations involved in growth-related issues
- Children, Youth and Environments Center for Research and Design—exploring how children's health and behavior are affected by the environment
- Colorado Center for Community Development providing design and planning assistance for underserved organizations, communities and neighborhoods

Students and faculty collaborate to develop productive relationships. The mentoring program was named one of three Best Practices in Mentorship nationally, by the American Institute of Architects in 2005.

College of Architecture and Planning students joined with architectural engineering students to design and build solar powered houses that won the first two national Department of Energy Solar Decathlon Competitions, held in 2002 and 2005.



# College of Arts & Media

## Dean: David Dynak, PhD, MA, BA

The arts change lives. The College of Arts & Media's (CAM) almost 1,200 students will change our society. Enrollment is competitive, and the college regularly fills to capacity, especially in the music and entertainment industry studies area.

CAM students perform and practice in the King Academic and Performing Arts Center, a complex that is home to a 500-seat concert hall, a 300-seat proscenium courtyard theatre, a 200-seat recital hall, a recording studio and professional shop spaces.

The Starz FilmCenter, a multiplex on campus and home of the Denver Film Society, screens foreign and "Indie" films and important documentaries for campus and community audiences.

The music and entertainment industry studies program has been the educational springboard for many new recording artists, producers, musicians and music entrepreneurs. The master of arts in recording sciences includes digital forensics and the preparation of teachers of recording arts as special areas of emphasis. Professor Rich Sanders directs the National Center for Audio/Video Forensics.

Engineering industries are increasingly global. More than 100 international students seeking various engineering degrees are currently enrolled. Students experience multicultural aspects of engineering and technology. The college's faculty and students have traveled to rural India, working with local communities on wind power projects.

College alumni are an important part of many Colorado industrial sectors. They include construction, transportation, energy and power, aerospace, communications, computers, software, manufacturing, biotechnology and instrumentation and controls. A number of graduates have gone on to other career paths such as law, education and medicine.

The Colorado School of Public Health (CSPH), is the university's newest school dedicated to health education and research. As the first school of public health in the Rocky Mountain West, the CSPH will advance the region's education, research and outreach efforts related to environmental and population-based health.

Operating collaboratively with Colorado State University and the University of Northern Colorado, the planned school will combine the expertise and resources of the university and its partners to improve the health of Colorado's communities.

Professional degrees offered by the CSPH include the *U.S.News & World Report*-ranked master of public health (MPH, formerly MSPH). The new school will also offer certificates, residencies in preventive medicine and occupational and environmental health medicine, and MS and PhD degrees through the AMC Graduate School.

# School of Dental Medicine

In this nationally recognized, award-winning school, students graduate with the ability to offer a broad range of dental services.

The School of Dental Medicine is one of the most selective in the United States, with more than 1,400 applicants annually for only 50 positions in the DDS program, and nearly 326 applicants for the International Dental Student program, which annually accepts 20 students. Post-doctoral residencies are available in general practice, orthodontics and periodontics.

Today, the School of Dental Medicine enrolls more than 230 students in its various degree granting and professional certificate programs.

All dental students provide an academic year's dental clinical care to underserved populations throughout Colorado, a requirement for graduation. Home to the region's only university-based dental implant center, the school pioneers research in oral cancer, salivary gland disease, neurobiology and pain control.

The school's collaborative research programs attract significant NIH/NIDCR funding and involve scientists in research with the School of Medicine and Cancer Center, in addition to bioengineering programs within the University of Colorado at Boulder College of Engineering and The Children's Hospital. In 2005, the School of Dental Medicine ranked 17th out of all U.S. dental schools in NIH funding.

Additionally, the school's patient care/community service programs have served as a national model for community-based clinical education and provide a safety net for Colorado's uninsured and underinsured families. This year, in collaboration with the School of Medicine, conversations began about starting a rural track program.

For more than three decades, the school has witnessed unprecedented growth and progress. Today this research-intensive, comprehensive dental school features internationally recognized educational, research and clinical programs powered by an outstanding faculty, a service-oriented staff and exceptional students.

Colorado's largest graduate school of education serves more than 2,100 degree/licensure-seeking students annually with another 5,000 in continuing education options. It is consistently ranked by *U.S.News & World Report* as one of the best education programs in the country, reaching #70 in America's Best Graduate Schools 2007 edition.

Fifty-two full-time faculty members along with 83 part-time faculty teach in undergraduate, post-baccalaureate and graduate teacher education as well as 10 graduate degree programs for educators and mental health providers at the master's, educational specialist and doctoral levels. These programs result in 13 types of licensure or endorsement.

A network of partnerships with Denver Public Schools and a number of the other largest metro districts enables students to gain the experience they need to succeed in any classroom. Course work is relevant and gives students a practical foundation to support teaching skills.

Faculty conduct substantial research, much of it focused on diversity and equity issues. Faculty also currently hold \$38 million in grants, equivalent to about \$8 million per year. Federal grants fund centers responsible for significant national direction in research and policy in urban school improvement, the training of paraprofessionals and several areas of special education, including autism, early childhood special education and overidentification of students with special needs.

The school is accredited by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE), Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP) and National Association of School Psychologists (NASP).

With 741 doctor of medicine and doctor of physical therapy students, the School of Medicine (SOM) is nationally and inter nationally known for programs of excellence in education, research, patient care and community service. Faculty serve as clinical experts and are physicians at University of Colorado Hospital, National Jewish Medical and Research Center, The Children's Hospital, Denver Health Medical Center and the Veterans Administration Medical Center.

Together with affiliated hospital partners, SOM faculty rank fourth out of 75 public medical schools in the country for National Institutes of Health (NIH) research expenditures; fifteenth among all medical schools (125 total). More than 415 faculty physicians are ranked as Best Doctors in America. Five faculty are members of the National Academy of Sciences, and 13 are in the Institute of Medicine.

The pace-setting College of Nursing enrolls nearly 700 undergraduate and graduate students. Knowledge of human responses and natural healing processes balancing technological advances and biomedical treatments and cures guides the nursing curriculum.

The college was founded in 1898. The bachelor's program was established in 1920. The school instituted the first nurse practitioner and school nurse programs in the United States. The doctor of nursing practice program, established in 2005, was built on the foundation of the former nursing doctorate initiated in 1990, and DNP graduates are prepared as clinical leaders who design models of health care delivery, evaluate clinical outcomes, identify and manage health care needs of populations and use technology and information to transform health care systems.

One of the oldest (established 1978) research doctoral programs in the west, the PhD program is widely recognized for faculty mentoring and innovative delivery. It is designed to prepare nurse scholars to advance the art, science and practice of the discipline. PhD preparation in nursing promotes knowledge for reflective, theory-guided and research-based nursing practice.







#### **Minority Persistence and Graduation Rates**

While the university does a good job of attracting and retaining first-time freshman minorities to the second fall, the university's record for graduating those undergraduate minorities has not been as successful. In the most recent fall-to-fall retention rate for firsttime freshmen, 70 percent of minorities and 71 percent of majority students were enrolled in the second fall. In the most recent published graduation cohort analysis, however, only 32 percent of minorities graduated in six years compared to 42 percent of the Caucasian students.



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
# Use of Financial Aid at Downtown Campus FY 2007





## Downtown Campus FY 2007 Actual Expenditures Total \$156,548,233





## Anschutz Medical Campus FY 2007 Actual Expenditures Total \$857,520,472



#### Anschutz Medical Campus Sources of Revenue




## Economic Contributions of UC Denver to Colorado's Economy, Fiscal Year 2005

UC Denver faculty and staff and affiliated University Physicians Inc. staff totaled nearly 9,100 employees in fiscal year 2005.

Institutional purchases of goods and services, research subcontracts to Colorado firms, and consumer spending by faculty, staff and students indirectly supported as many as 10,624 jobs in Colorado.

Institutional and student spending directly and indirectly supported about 19,704 jobs in Colorado in fiscal year 2005.



## UC Denver Contributions to Statewide Personal Income

UC Denver operations and associated student spending supported total personal income of nearly \$973 million in Colorado in fiscal year 2005.

More than \$580 million of the total represented the direct payroll of faculty and staff employed by UC Denver. An additional \$392 million in earnings and non-wage income was realized as a result of the indirect and induced effects of the direct effects.

As a result of the concentration of direct jobs in health care and higher education, the average income for all jobs supported by UC Denver exceeded \$45,000 in fiscal year 2005.
