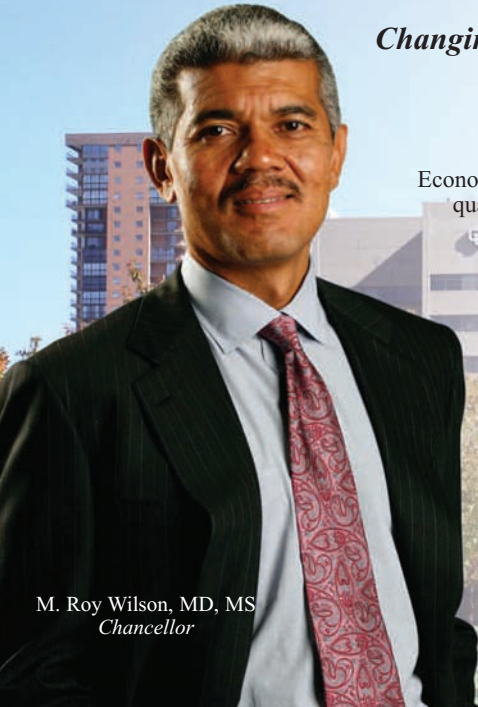

The University of Colorado Denver (UC Denver) is the state's number one research university, offering comprehensive programs for undergraduate, graduate and health sciences students on two campuses—one in Denver and one in Aurora.

UC Denver faculty and researchers are the foundation of the reputation for excellence and innovation characteristic of the University of Colorado.

- 119 degree programs in 13 schools and colleges
- collaboration across subject areas to create degree programs that prepare graduates to meet tomorrow's challenges
- more than \$371 million in sponsored research each year, breaking ground in a number of areas from advances in treatments for various types of cancers to creating more sustainable urban infrastructures and better public schools
- serves more than 30,000 students on two

campuses; this includes online and in programs and centers across the state of Colorado

- UC Denver receives less than 10% of total revenues from state appropriations
- students come from 50 states and 128 countries
- awards more graduate degrees than any other Colorado institution
- more than 60 centers and institutes extending the reach of teaching and research into the community covering subjects from entrepreneurship and education policy to medical and health concerns

The origins of the current UC Denver began in Boulder in 1883 with the creation of a medical department (two students and two senior faculty).

The College of Nursing was established in 1898. The School of Pharmacy was established in 1911.

In 1912, the University of Colorado at Boulder created an extension in Denver. In 1972, the University of Colorado at Denver was created, one of three institutions occupying the Auraria Campus downtown. In 2004, the downtown entity consolidated with the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center. In 2006, the university declared its official name as the University of Colorado Denver with two campus locations.

The state's only architecture school offers an undergraduate program for 895 students on the Boulder campus and graduate programs for 526 students in Denver. Programs are accredited by the Landscape Architecture Accreditation Board (LAAB), National Architecture Accrediting Board (NAAB) and Planning Accreditation Board (PAB).

As one of the country's largest colleges of architecture and related design and planning disciplines, the college is able to create a number of communities of interest across the disciplines, bringing together faculty, students and practitioners and building synergistic relationships. These communities of interest are creating areas of prominence and distinction for the college and include:

- emerging practices in design
- sustainable urbanism
- healthy environments
- cultural heritage

Supporting these communities are centers that offer field experience:

- Center of Preservation Research—supporting historic preservation research projects
- Colorado Center for Sustainable Urbanism—studying growth-oriented issues, disseminating information, testing growth scenarios and providing expertise to cities and organizations involved in growth-related issues
- Children, Youth and Environments Center for Research and Design—exploring how children’s health and behavior are affected by the environment
- Colorado Center for Community Development—providing design and planning assistance for underserved organizations, communities and neighborhoods

Students and faculty collaborate to develop productive relationships. The mentoring program was named one of three Best Practices in Mentorship nationally, by the American Institute of Architects in 2005.

College of Architecture and Planning students joined with architectural engineering students to design and build solar powered houses that won the first two national Department of Energy Solar Decathlon Competitions.

More than 1,200 students in the College of Arts & Media (CAM) are immersed in a challenging, rewarding, supportive and rich learning program that focuses on the intersection of art, the creative industry and emerging technology. CAM students change and grow through practicing art every day, preparing for lifetimes of influencing and changing society through art.

CAM film and theatre students use up-to-date equipment and facilities, including a film equipment cage, new postproduction laboratories and the Kenneth Kendall King Academic and Performing Arts Center, which houses a 500-seat concert hall, a 300-seat flexible form theatre and a 200-seat recital hall as well as production shops, production studio and a recording studio.

Digital art creation and the convergence of classic and new technologies challenge visual arts students. Program instruction in 3-D animation, digital design and transmedia as well as painting, drawing, art history, photography and sculpture encourages students to push the limits of emerging and traditional art forms.

Music industry studies present a nontraditional music education that focuses on the entertainment business as well as on performance and music recording technology. The MS in recording arts includes study in digital forensics and the preparation of teachers of recording arts. Students use specially built facilities with recording studios, computer-for-music laboratories and practice rooms for individual artists and ensembles.

CAM faculty are distinguished by their commitment to teaching undergraduate students and a small number of graduate students. Many are noted artists in their fields, regularly performing and exhibiting their works across the United States and around the globe.

The college benefits from the presence of the Denver Performing Arts Complex, one of the largest multi-institution cultural facilities in the world, and the Denver Art Museum. The Starz Denver FilmCenter, which shows films year round and is home to the Starz Denver Film Festival, is located on campus.

In this nationally recognized, award-winning school, students graduate with the ability to offer a broad range of dental services.

The School of Dental Medicine is one of the most selective in the United States, with more than 1,400 applicants annually for only 52 positions in the DDS program, and nearly 350 applicants for the international student program, which annually accepts 24 students. Postdoctoral residencies are available in general practice residency, orthodontics and periodontics.

All dental students provide an academic year's dental clinical care to underserved populations throughout Colorado, a requirement for graduation. Home to the region's only university-based dental implant center, the school pioneers research in oral cancer, salivary gland disease, neurobiology, craniofacial developmental biology and pain control.

The school's collaborative research programs attract significant NIH/NIDCR funding and involve scientists in research with the

School of Medicine and Cancer Center, in addition to bioengineering programs within the University of Colorado at Boulder College of Engineering and The Children's Hospital. In 2007, the School of Dental Medicine ranked in the top 20 out of all U.S. dental schools in NIH funding.

Additionally, the school's patient care/community service programs continue to serve as a national model for community-based, multidisciplinary clinical education and provide a safety net for Colorado's uninsured and underinsured families. Recent collaborations with the School of Medicine, including initiation of a rural track, have made great strides in solidifying new thinking about the oral-systemic connection in patients.

For more than three decades, the school has witnessed unprecedented growth and progress. Today, this research-intensive, comprehensive dental school features internationally recognized educational, research and clinical programs powered by an outstanding faculty, a service-oriented staff and truly exceptional students.

Colorado's largest graduate school of education serves more than 2,100 degree/licensure students annually, with another 6,000 in continuing education options. The school prepares and inspires education and mental health leaders to have a profound impact in fostering student opportunity, achievement and success in urban and diverse communities. Areas of study include programs for new teachers, experienced teachers, school administrators, counselors, school psychologists, school librarians, as well as technology and research professionals.

The school has 66 full-time faculty members along with 118 part-time faculty who teach undergraduate, graduate and doctoral-level courses. Faculty members are backed by \$38 million in faculty and research grants. Faculty research focuses on diversity and equity issues in education and counseling in urban school and communities. Centers within the school sponsor research and policy studies, engage in model demonstration and product development, conduct longitudinal studies on the effectiveness of early intervention procedures, provide education and training to people across the country and collaborate with professional organizations and local communities.

The College of Engineering and Applied Science provides education for both undergraduate and graduate students, enrolling more than 500 undergraduates and more than 300 graduate students. The majority of students join Colorado industries when they graduate. Many students are already working in local businesses while pursuing their education. The college's mission is to help students succeed in the workplace and build their professional careers. All four undergraduate degree programs are accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology.

Students choose their specialization from four disciplines: civil engineering, computer engineering, electrical engineering and mechanical engineering. The college emphasizes integrating foundational knowledge and skills with real-world application. Through hands-on experience, students develop their capabilities in problem solving, research and teamwork. Students have many opportunities to learn skills such as measuring particles in water, modeling traffic patterns, assessing bridges and roads, developing computer animation and simulation programs, engineering communication and computer networks and measuring at nanoscale

With 757 doctor of medicine and doctor of physical therapy students, the School of Medicine (SOM) is nationally and internationally known for programs of excellence in education, research, patient care and community service. Its MD program is accredited by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME).

Faculty serve as clinical experts and are physicians at University of Colorado Hospital, National Jewish Health, The Children's Hospital, Denver Health Medical Center and the Veterans Administration Medical Center.

Together with affiliated hospital partners, SOM faculty rank fourth out of 75 public medical schools in the country for National Institutes of Health (NIH) research expenditures; 14th among all medical schools (125 total). In 2008, 475 faculty physicians ranked as Best Doctors in America. Four faculty are members of the National Academy of Sciences, and 14 are in the Institute of Medicine.

Faculty are discovering tomorrow's cures, unlocking the fundamental mechanisms of adult and children's diabetes, obesity, alcoholism, cancer (breast, kidney, prostate, lung and skin), heart disease, emphysema and organ transplants, among others.

The pace-setting College of Nursing enrolls nearly 700 undergraduate and graduate students. Knowledge of human responses and natural healing processes balancing technological advances and biomedical treatments and cures guides the nursing curriculum.

The college was founded in 1898, and the bachelor's program was established in 1920. The school instituted the first nurse practitioner and school nurse programs in the United States. The doctor of nursing practice (DNP) program, established in 2005, was built on the foundation of the former nursing doctorate initiated in 1990, and DNP graduates are prepared as clinical leaders who design models of health care delivery, evaluate clinical outcomes, identify and manage health care needs of populations and use technology and information to transform health care systems.

One of the oldest (established 1978) research doctoral programs in the west, the PhD program is widely recognized for faculty mentoring and innovative delivery. It is designed to prepare nurse scholars to advance the art, science and practice of the discipline. PhD preparation in nursing promotes knowledge for reflective, theory-guided and research-based nursing practice.

The college has a 30-year history of distance education, especially serving citizens of Colorado, and synchronous interactive television delivers classes in more than nine locations across the state. Online education was instituted in 1996; now more than 75 percent of courses may be taken online. The RN to BS and several master's options can be completed totally online. The School of Pharmacy is one of the top-ranked pharmacy schools in the nation, enrolling more than 600 professional and graduate students. Committed to pharmaceutical education, research and patient care, the school educates students in the properties of medicinal agents, the biology of disease, the pharmacological and toxicological actions of drugs and the current best practices for clinical and therapeutic uses of drugs. Students engage in experiential learning at sites across Colorado. Nontraditional PharmD and ongoing education programs provide continuing professional development for pharmacists in Colorado and throughout the United States and Canada.

Consistently among the top ten U.S. pharmacy schools in federal research funding, the school's internationally renowned faculty conduct pioneering basic, translational and clinical research in a variety of scientific fields such as pharmaceutical biotechnology and biophysics, drug development, pharmacokinetics, pharmacogenomics, molecular toxicology, clinical therapeutics and health outcomes. Specialized focus areas include cancer, diabetes, cardiovascular disease, neurological disease, infectious diseases, HIV/AIDS and critical care medicine.

The school has garnered numerous milestones with the National Institutes of Health:

- Ranked in the top 20 percent of pharmacy schools by *U.S. News & World Report*
- Top three in percentage of PharmD faculty with NIH funding

An \$11 million gift from The ALSAM Foundation will enable the school to construct a new clinical and research facility at the Anschutz Medical Campus in Aurora; the school will be renamed the Skaggs School of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences upon completion of the building in 2011.

Pharmacy postgraduate training offers residencies in general pharmacy practice, ambulatory care-family medicine, critical care, infectious diseases and oncology and fellowship programs in critical care/infectious diseases and neurology. All residencies are accredited by the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP), the nation's primary accrediting body for pharmacy postgraduate training programs.

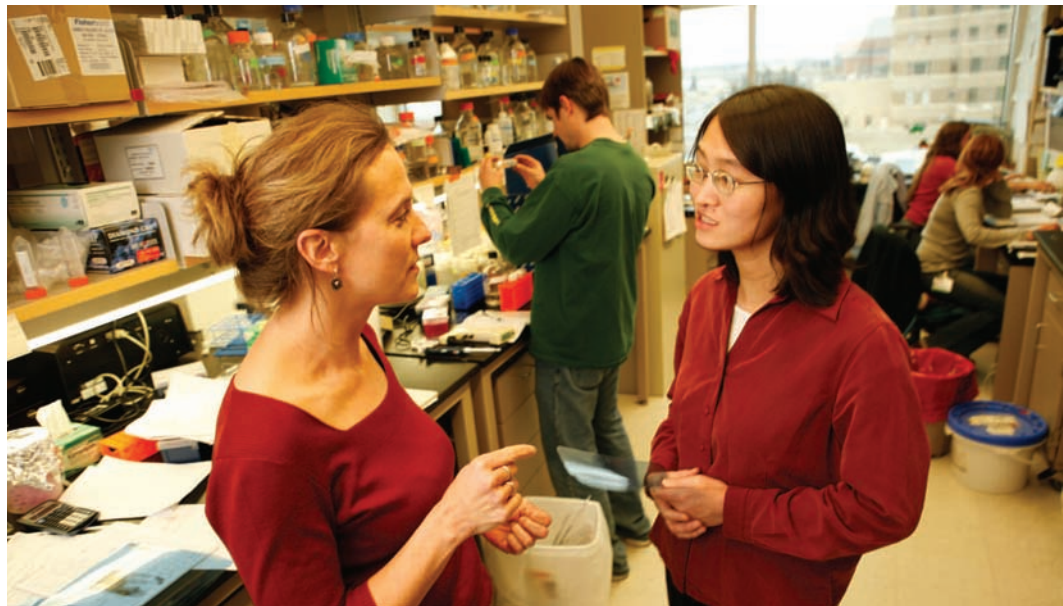

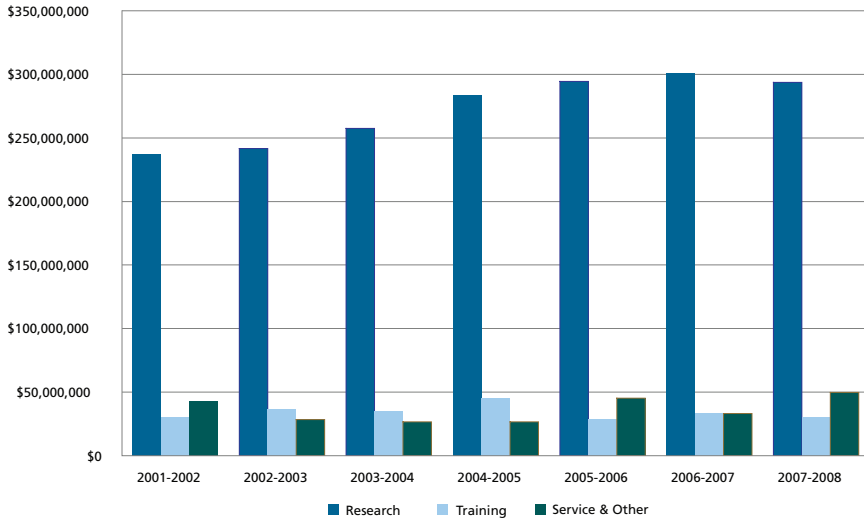

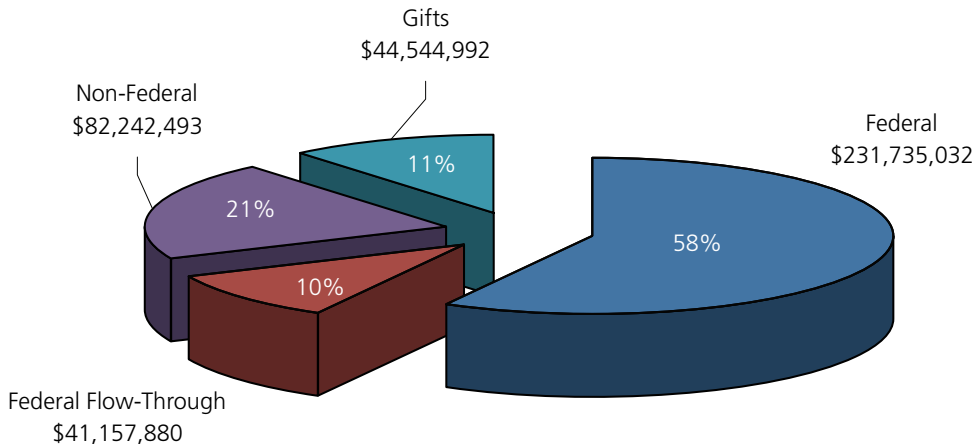

UC Denver Enrollment Trends

During the last five years, the Downtown Campus of the University of Colorado Denver has seen enrollment increases for three of the four major groups of students.

- 1) Undergraduate resident enrollments have increased continuously from fall 2004 to fall 2008, reaching 7,878 for fall 2008.
- 2) During the same time frame, undergraduate nonresident enrollments increased each year, with the exception of fall 2005. However, fall 2008 enrollment of 693 is significantly more than what was attained in fall 2004 (424).
- 3) The exception was for graduate resident enrollment—each year a decline was experienced. Since fall 2004, there has been an overall decrease of about 13 percent.
- 4) Like their undergraduate nonresident counterparts, the graduate nonresident student enrollments increased each year, except for fall 2005.

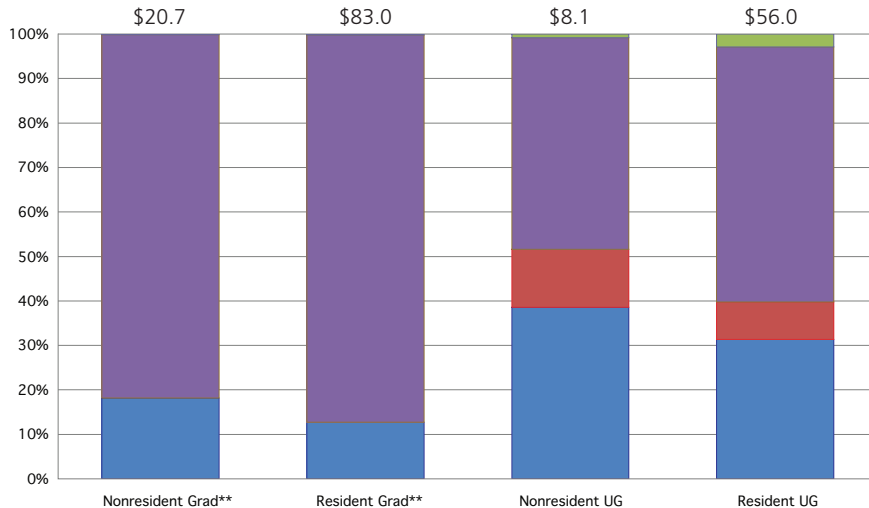

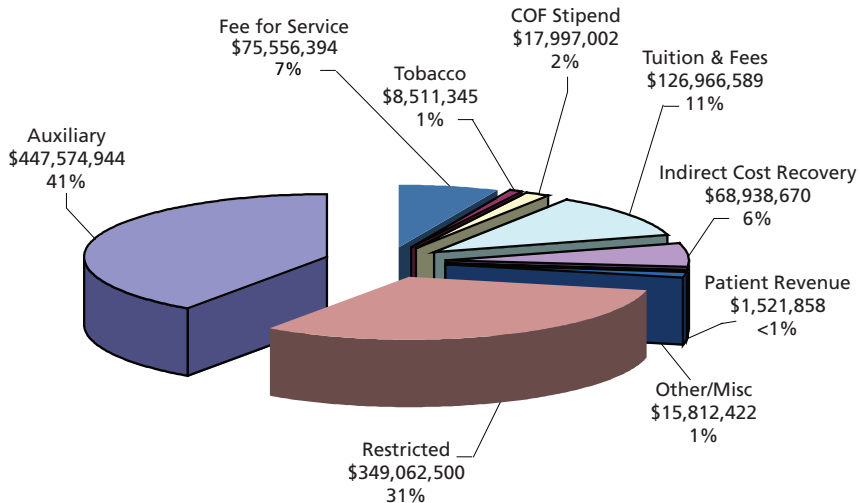




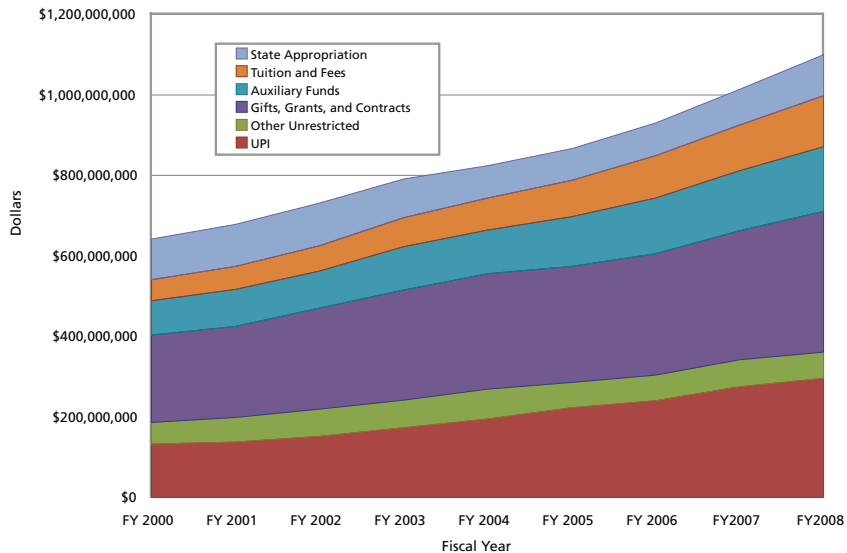

University of Colorado Denver Sources of Revenue



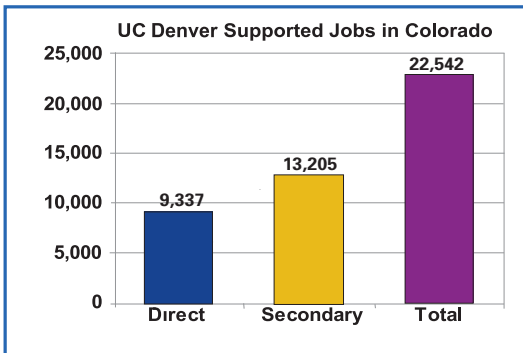

Economic Contributions of UC Denver to Colorado's Economy, Fiscal Year 2008

UC Denver faculty and staff, including both the Downtown and Anschutz Medical Campuses, and members and staff of its University Physicians Inc. affiliate, totaled 9,337 individuals in fiscal year 2008.

Institutional purchases of goods and services, research subcontracts with Colorado firms, and consumer spending by faculty, staff and students indirectly supported as many as 13,205 jobs elsewhere in Colorado.

Institutional, staff and student spending directly and indirectly supported about 22,500 jobs in Colorado in fiscal year 2008.



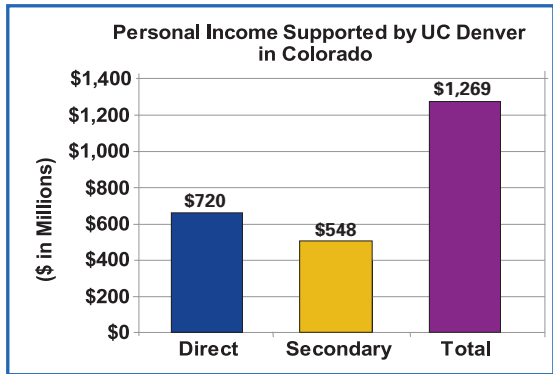

UC Denver Contributions to Statewide Personal Income

UC Denver operations and associated student spending supported total personal income of nearly \$1.27 billion in Colorado in fiscal year 2008.

More than \$720 million of the total represented the direct payroll of faculty and staff employed by UC Denver and UPI. \$549 million in additional earnings and nonwage income was realized as a result of the indirect and induced effects (multipliers) of the direct payroll and student spending.

As a result of the concentration of direct jobs in health care and higher education, the average income for all jobs supported by UC Denver exceeded \$56,000 in fiscal year 2008.
