A Remarkable Research University

The University of Colorado Denver | Anschutz Medical Campus is the state's number one research funded university, offering comprehensive programs for undergraduate, graduate and health sciences students on two campuses—in downtown Denver and on the Anschutz Medical Campus in Aurora—and in centers and institutes across the state. Faculty and researchers are the foundation of the reputation for discovery and innovation characteristic of the University of Colorado.

- 134 degree programs in 13 schools and colleges (FY 2010-11)
- collaborative degree programs that prepare graduates to meet tomorrow's challenges
- nearly \$422 million in sponsored research awards, breaking ground in a number of areas, from

advancing cancer treatments to creating more sustainable urban infrastructures and better public schools

- students educated on two campuses, online and in programs and centers across the state of Colorado
- less than 9 percent of total revenues is from state appropriations
- students come from 50 states and 85 countries (FY 2010-11)

History

The origins of the current university began in Boulder in 1883 with the creation of a medical department (two students and two senior faculty). The College of Nursing was established in 1898. The School of Pharmacy was established in 1911. In 1912, the University of Colorado created an extension in Denver. In 1972, the University of Colorado at Denver was created, one of three institutions occupying the Auraria Campus downtown. In 2004, the downtown entity consolidated with the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center to establish the two campus university known today as the University of Colorado Denver | Anschutz Medical Campus.

In recent years students have built award-winning, solar-powered homes; written new codes to encourage livelier, safer cities; discovered ecological design principles in Colorado ranches; proposed ways for neighborhoods to recover from natural disasters; designed learning landscapes for elementary school playgrounds; designed and built an environmentally sustainable home in the Navajo Nation; and collaborated with students at Dar Al-Hekma College in Saudi Arabia on ideas for affordable housing.

More than 1,200 students in the College of Arts & Media (CAM) are immersed in a challenging, rewarding, supportive and rich learning environment that focuses on the intersection of art, the creative industries, and emerging technology. CAM students change and grow through classes and making art every day as they prepare for lifetimes of influencing and changing society through art. CAM film and theatre students use up-to-date professional equipment and facilities, postproduction laboratories and the Kenneth Kendall King Academic and Performing Arts Center, which houses a 500-seat concert hall, a 300-seat flexible form theatre and a 200-seat recital hall as well as production shops, production studio and a recording studio.

Digital art creation and the convergence of classic and new technologies challenge visual arts students. Program instruction in 3-D animation, digital design and transmedia, as well as painting, drawing, art history, photography and sculpture encourages students to push the limits of emerging and traditional art forms. Music industry studies offers a nontraditional music education that focuses on the entertainment business and creative industries,

The MS in recording arts includes study in media forensics, the preparation of teachers of recording arts, and cutting-edge postproduction techniques. Students use specially-built facilities with recording studios, computer-for-music laboratories and rehearsal rooms for individual artists and ensembles.

CAM faculty are distinguished by their commitment to teaching undergraduate students and graduate students. Not only do many have prestigious degrees and academic records, they are noted artists in their fields, regularly performing and exhibiting their works across the United States and around the globe.

The college benefits from the proximity of the Denver Performing Arts Complex, the Denver Art Museum and a multitude of performance and gallery venues in downtown Denver. Denver's position as center of the Rocky Mountain West provides a launching pad for international study programs abroad and attracts international students.

This research-intensive, comprehensive dental school increases access to innovative education programs, life-improving research and excellent clinical care programs that enhance oral and systemic health. The School of Dental Medicine (SDM) is home to a DDS program, an international dental program, a general practice residency and advanced dental education (residency) programs in periodontics and orthodontics in which enrollees may obtain postdoctoral master's degrees.

The SDM's DDS program is one of the most selective in the United States, with more than 1,400 applicants annually for only 80 positions in the DDS program and nearly 350 applicants for the international student program, which annually accepts 40 students. Its education programs are evidence-based, interprofessional and teach students to treat patients of all ages as members of a health care team. The school's collaborative research programs have focus areas in cancer biology, craniofacial developmental biology and dental materials and bioengineering. The dental scientists collaborate with the CU Cancer Center, the CU School of Medicine

and the CU Boulder College of Engineering on funded research projects. In FY 2010-2011, the school ranked 22 out of 48 dental schools in National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research (NIDCR) funding. Dental medicine faculty's collaborative research with other university faculty ranks CU Denver 14th for NIDCR funding.

The SDM has a long commitment to increasing access to care for disadvantaged populations. Its community-based education program serves as a national model for service learning in dental education. Students provide care in clinics around the state as well as on the school's Mobile Dental Clinic. Students are also able to participate in rural and global health tracks.

The educational programs of the SDM are nationally recognized for their quality and are fully accredited by the American Dental Association.

Colorado's largest graduate school of education serves more than 2,000 degree/licensure students annually, with another 6,400 in continuing education options. The school prepares and inspires education and mental health leaders to have a profound impact in fostering student opportunity, achievement and success in urban and diverse communities. Areas of study include programs for new teachers, experienced teachers, school administrators, counselors, school psychologists, school librarians, as well as technology and research professionals.

The school has 44 full-time faculty members along with 94 part-time faculty who teach undergraduate, graduate and doctoral-level courses. Faculty members are backed by \$25 million in faculty and research and professional development grants. Faculty research focuses on issues of diversity and equity in education, math education, assessment in education and counseling in urban schools and communities. Centers within the school sponsor research and policy studies, engage in model demonstration and product development, conduct longitudinal studies on the effectiveness of early intervention procedures, provide education and training

to people across the country and collaborate with professional organizations and local communities.

The school's newly designed urban teacher education program answers the call from metro Denver districts for new teachers who can ensure K-12 student success in increasingly diverse classrooms. The program is a national model for teacher preparation, taking place in a citywide laboratory in which faculty and teacher candidates partner with professional development schools, community agencies and educational organizations to address challenges by building on the assets of urban community knowledge.

The school has an extensive network of alumni who are leaders in the surrounding Denver metro area school districts and counseling offices.

The school is accredited by the Colorado Department of Education, the Colorado Department of Higher Education, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs, and the National Association of School Psychologists.

The College of Engineering and Applied Science provides education for both undergraduate and graduate students, enrolling more than 600 undergraduates and more than 400 graduate students. The majority of students join Colorado industries when they graduate. Many students are already working in local businesses while pursuing their education. The college's mission is to help students succeed in the workplace and build their professional careers by providing an accessible education. All four undergraduate degree programs are accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology, also known as ABET.

Students choose their specialization from five disciplines: bioengineering, civil engineering, computer science and engineering, electrical engineering and mechanical engineering. The college emphasizes integrating foundational knowledge and skills with real-world application. Through hands-on experience, students develop their capabilities in problem solving, research and teamwork. Students have many opportunities to learn skills such as measuring particles in water, modeling traffic patterns, assessing bridges and roads, developing computer animation and simulation programs, engineering communication and computer networks

and measuring at nanoscale using an atomic force microscope. Bioengineering graduate students apply engineering principles and techniques to medical and biological fields, providing improvements in people's lives through devices such as artificial hands and heart valves and techniques such as medical imaging for diagnostics.

Nearly 200 international students seeking various engineering degrees are currently enrolled. Students experience multicultural aspects of engineering and technology.

College alumni are an important part of many Colorado industrial sectors, including transportation, energy and power, construction, fluid mechanics, aerospace, computer graphics, hydrology, bioengineering, communications, computer networks, structural and earthquake engineering, biophotonics, geographic information systems, manufacturing, sustainability, concrete materials, tribology, instrumentation and control systems, and environmental engineering. Additionally, a number of graduates have gone on to other career paths such as law, education and medicine.

The College of Nursing enrolls nearly 800 undergraduate and graduate students. Founded in 1898, the college began Colorado's first baccalaureate program and has offered graduate education since 1950. The baccalaureate curriculum prepares transformational nurse clinicians who collaboratively promote excellence in patient safety and quality health care through inquiry, reflection, and accountability. In 2010, the college partnered with Community College of Aurora (CCA) to create an integrated pathway program to increase access for community college students to the undergraduate program, the first such program in Colorado. The first students successfully completed their pre-requisite courses at CCA and seamlessly transitioned to the college to begin their nursing courses.

The master's program educates advanced practice nurses, specialists in health care informatics and nursing leadership and health systems and administers a graduate-level post-master's certificate program. The college established the first nurse practitioner and first school nurse programs in the United States. The college features active faculty practices at more than 12 primary care, acute care, case management, consultative and nurse midwifery sites throughout Colorado.

Newly revised curriculum started fall 2011

The Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) program educates nurses for the highest level of nursing practice and is the terminal clinical degree in nursing. Graduates are clinical leaders who design models of health care delivery, evaluate clinical outcomes, identify and manage health care needs of populations and use technology and information to transform health care systems.

The research doctoral program (PhD) creates knowledge for reflective, theory-guided and research-based nursing practice. The innovative, distance-accessible curriculum educates nurse scientists to lead research in health care systems and biobehavioral science.

The college's master of science program has ranked in the top 15 for the past eight years by *U.S. News & World Report*. Also receiving national ranking in 2011; the Pediatric Nurse Practitioner specialty area ranked #5.

The college has over 30 years of history providing distance education, especially serving the citizens of Colorado. Synchronous interactive television delivers classes in more than nine locations

across the state. Seventy-five percent of courses may be taken online, with the RN to BS and two masters' specialty options available totally online.

The college has four endowed chairs and two endowed professorships. Forty faculty are fellows in major national organizations including the American Academy of Nursing, American Academy of Nurse Practitioners, American College of Nurse Midwives, the American College of Medical Informatics, and specialty and practice societies. Two faculty are editors of major nursing journals.

The college is fully accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education and the Higher Learning Commission of North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. The nurse midwifery master's specialty is further accredited by the American College of Nurse Midwives, Division of Accreditation.

With more than 900 doctor of pharmacy and graduate students, the Skaggs School of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences is preparing the world's future pharmacists and pharmaceutical scientists through innovative learning and teaching.

As experts in medicines and their therapeutic use, students and faculty are caring for patients, optimizing medication outcomes, and helping patients live longer and better with chronic illnesses such as heart disease and diabetes.

The collaborations in research, patient care and community service are helping make health care safer.

Faculty members conduct pioneering basic, translational and clinical research in a variety of scientific fields such as pharmaceutical biotechnology and biophysics, medicinal chemistry and drug discovery, pharmacokinetics, pharmacogenomics, molecular toxicology, clinical therapeutics and health outcomes.

The school is improving the stability of medicines to reduce deadly reactions and ensure product safety and effectiveness. Students

are vaccinating thousands against influenza and pneumonia, while faculty members discover new ways to deliver and transport vaccines to developing nations.

Faculty members serve as experts at the University of Colorado Hospital, University of Colorado Cancer Center, Denver Health Medical Center and clinics for underserved populations. Pharmacy postgraduate training opportunities include residencies accredited by the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists in general pharmacy practice, ambulatory care-family medicine, critical care and oncology and fellowship programs in critical care/infectious diseases, neurology, and oncology. A new community pharmacy residency program was started in collaboration with King Soopers in 2010, and a new clinical oncology fellowship began in 2011.

Students donate hundreds of hours of community service and provide thousands of dollars of care annually by organizing and volunteering at local and statewide health fairs. In addition, the school hosts an annual medication drug disposal event, which has successfully collected and disposed of thousands of pounds of over-the-counter, complimentary, and unused or expired medications for the Denver-metro area community.






Awards by Function: 10 Year Comparison

Student Diversity

Diversity is at the heart of the mission, vision and value statements of the University of Colorado Denver | Anschutz Medical Campus, driving its success in engaging the people and communities it serves.

Much of the successful recruitment and enrollment of diverse students at the Denver Campus is the result of strong preschool-20 (P-20) partnerships, the development of pre-collegiate preparation programs and outreach initiatives such as the Denver Transfer Initiative Title V grant, recent collaborations with Aurora and Denver Public Schools and the on-campus residential facility (Campus Village apartments).

The proportion of undergraduate students of color at the University of Colorado Denver | Anschutz Medical Campus has increased each year since 2005, with a high of 31 percent for fall 2010. The percentage of first professional students of color at the Anschutz Medical Campus was 23.5 percent for fall 2010, the highest it has been since 2004.

In addition, during fall 2010, 36 percent of undergraduate students on the Denver Campus were the first generation in their families to attend college, while international students accounted for five percent of the total University of Colorado Denver | Anschutz Medical Campus student population.




University of Colorado Denver Campus Financial Aid Overview FY 2010-11






University of Colorado Denver FY 2010-11 Actual Revenues

Impact on State Employment



Impacts on State Personal Income


University operations and student spending supported nearly \$1.43 billion in state personal income in FY 2010.

More than \$849 million of the total represented the direct payroll of university faculty, medical residents, staff, student workers and University Physicians, Inc. \$580 million in additional earnings was realized as a result of the indirect and induced effects of direct payroll and student spending.

Due to the concentration of direct jobs in health care and higher education, the average income for jobs supported by the university was more than \$59,000 in FY 2010.
