COLORADO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

BICYCLE/PEDESTRIAN PROGRAM

The purpose of the CDOT Bicycle/Pedestrian program is to promote walking and bicycling as viable modes of transportation by encouraging their use, and by addressing issues regarding improvements in engineering, education, and enforcement. Much is being done at the state level to foster a pro-bicycling and pro-walking ethic in individuals, private sector organizations, and all levels of government by creating a bicycle- and pedestrian-friendly transportation infrastructure throughout the state.

The program provides technical guidance and continuing education for planners, engineers and traffic safety professionals, and encourages education and enforcement programs that

increase the safety of bicycling and walking. In addition, the program is responsible for production and distribution of public information materials including the "Colorado Bicycling Manual" and the "Rules of the Road and Trail" wallet cards. Other program activities include promoting Colorado Bike Month each June, the Colorado Bicycle/Pedestrian Summit, Train the Trainer Safety Education Courses for community professionals that teach safety education to children, and managing the Colorado Bikeways Signing project, as well as the annual Share the Road/Share the Trail campaign. THE STATE PARKS/STATE TRAILS PROGRAM

Since its establishment in 1971, the State Trails Program has been active in encouraging development of all varieties of trails. Trails continue as a priority of Colorado State Parks in helping to provide better outdoor recreation for people of all ages, interests and abilities. Its goal is to develop a



statewide network of trails to link communities, preserve open space, and provide access to public lands. Regional and statewide trail planning is coordinated with agencies, counties and communities, and trail, recreation and environmental organizations.

In addition to funding more than \$1 million in local trail projects each year, the State Trails Program also provides other aid to local communities in technical assistance, planning, coordination with other agencies, trail volunteer organization, working with trail foundations, working with elected officials on legislation affecting trails, trail dedication through land development regulations, and providing a resource center on all aspects of trails. Other projects include conversion of abandon-

ed railroads to trails, the use of irrigation canals and other utility corridors for trails, and long-distance trails. A bimonthly newsletter provides information on trail events, projects, legislation, construction and management. The State Trails Symposium is a statewide conference to bring trails activists and experts together. The State Trails Committee is a citizens' advisory group which provides input on trails issues, recommends state policies, and helps select trail projects for funding.

Colorado State Parks Off Highway Vehicle (OHV) Program

Many exciting and beautiful areas in Colorado can be explored on an off-highway vehicle. There are routes for motorcycles, all-terrain vehicles, and four-wheel-drive vehicles on public lands throughout Colorado, with tremendous scenery and challenges for all abilities.

Before heading out, owners of OHVs need to be aware of a Colorado law administered by Colorado State Parks. It requires the registration of all-terrain vehicles (ATVs), unlicensed motorcycles (dirt bikes), unlicensed four-wheel drives, and dune buggies operated on public lands. This law is the basis of the Colorado Off-Highway Vehicle Program, and registration fees fund the program. The OHV Program funds trail maintenance and construction, trailheads, parking areas, trail signs and maps; theft prevention and vehicle identification; programs to encourage safe and responsible OHV; and search-and-rescue efforts. Registration funds also help local, state and federal land managers to better manage our natural resources where motorized recreation takes place. Since the program started in 1990, more than \$1 million has been spent for on-the-ground trail improvements, which

includes protecting sensitive areas as well as improving OHV opportunities. For information on registering your vehicle, call Colorado State Parks at 303/791-1920. For ATV safety training information, call 800/447-4700.

Where to ride in Colorado

Know before you go. Contact the local U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management or other appropriate agency office to find out about trails, roads or areas open to OHV use (see the listings for federal land management offices in this publication). All federal roads, areas and trails are categorized as open, closed or restricted in some manner. Find out what the regulations are in the area where you will be riding. Preserve your right to ride. Help to protect the trails you ride. You can make a difference by riding safely and responsibly.

Colorado Off Highway Vehicle Coalition

The Colorado Off Highway Vehicle Coalition (COHVCO) was formed in 1987 by motorized recreationists wanting to ensure a positive future for responsible use of OHVs on public land. The all-volunteer group represents the 190,000 Coloradans who use motorcycles, four-wheel drives, ATVs and snowmobiles to enjoy the Colorado backcountry.

These OHV recreationists inject approximately \$500 million per year into the state economy. Providing a unified voice for these individuals is COHVCO's principle function.

A key to the success of the Coalition has been the development of positive working relationships with local, state and federal land managers, including the Colorado Division of Parks and Outdoor Recreation, USDA Forest Service, and Bureau of Land Management. COHVCO also works directly with state and federal legislators. COHVCO has helped facilitate OHV recreationists and land managers working together in issues resulting in pro-active problem solving. Through grants from the OHV and Snowmobile registration programs, motorized recreationists help fund \$150,000-plus on-the-ground projects each year for trail maintenance, parking facilities, restrooms, maps and signs, as well as user education materials.

COHVCO strongly supports the Great Outdoors Colorado initiative, directing lottery funds to outdoor uses. It has also been actively involved in the wilderness designation process over the last six years, resulting in praise from almost all of Colorado's legislators. Colorado Snowmobile Association

The Colorado Snowmobile Association (CSA) is a recreation orga-

nization for the some 4000 snowmobilers in the state. Founded in 1970, the association's 39 clubs are funded entirely by membership dues. Much of the annual fees go toward marking and maintaining the 3000 miles of trails in Colorado. A highly successful program, the CSA maintains a strong relationship with the Colorado Off Highway Vehicle Program and Colorado State Parks resulting in a model program of citizen/government interaction. Colorado Association of Four-wheel Drive Clubs

The CA4WDCI is an organized group of Colorado four-wheel drive clubs united to enhance and protect four-wheel drive recreation, as well as to educate the novice four-wheeler, while promoting a strong commitment to the environment. Established in 1968, the CA4WDCI currently has 38 member clubs across Colorado who, together, maintain more than 40 four-wheel-drive roads through 3000 hours of annual volunteer service. The organization publishes mapbooks to four-wheel-drive roads, helps organize local area 4x4 clubs, and maintains a strong relationship with the Colorado Off Highway Vehicle Coalition. The Colorado Horse Council (COHOCO) is a not-for-profit corporation formed in 1972 to represent the common interests of horse owners and the horse industry. To achieve this goal, COHOCO sponsors educational programs and materials, and equine research. COHOCO is the leader in promoting legislation, ordinances and regulations that enhance the horse industry. COHOCO strives to network with all equestrians and horse organizations on a state and national level to unite equestrians from all breeds, disciplines and business in a powerful, common voice. COHOCO's Network for Equestrian Trails (NET) is a subcommittee created to unite, educate and represent equestrian trail users statewide. NET is compiling a list of equestrian trails throughout Colorado that will be monitored to protect the rights of equestrians and act as a forum for solving problems for equestrian trail riders. This list of statewide trails will be published as a field guide of trails for

Your Lottery dollars at work in Colorado

Since 1983, the Colorado Lottery has provided more than \$8 million for trails construction grants throughout the state through the State Trails Program of Colorado State Parks. But trails are only part of the story. Since the Lottery began in 1983, more than \$3 billion has been pumped back into our state's economy. More than half that amount, some \$1.6 billion, has gone back to players in the way of prizes. More than 200 people have won grand prizes of \$1 million or more. And more than \$707 million has gone to improve the quality of life we enjoy in Colorado through the Lottery's four funds:

① Colorado State Parks has received \$75.6 million since 1983, including the state trails grants that go to local communities. State Parks projects include picnic and camping areas, trails, and the development of new state parks such as Mueller Ranch and the Colorado River State Park.

② The Conservation Trust Fund has received more than \$303 million for local parks and recreation providers — and that means improvements to the recreation amenities in our own backyards. Big cities, small towns,

counties, and recreation districts all receive annual distributions of Lottery revenue from this fund.

③ The Capital Construction Fund has received more than \$412 million for a wide variety of public facilities, such as the engineering hall at Colorado School of Mines, a new armory in Montrose, the new prison in Limon, and new buildings at Pueblo Community College. Following a vote of the public in 1992, the Capital Construction Fund will be phased out by fiscal year 1999.

④ The 1992 vote called for the development of a new fund. Monies to the Great Outdoors Colorado Trust Fund are designated for the preservation and enhancement of Colorado's park, open space, outdoor recreation and wildlife resources.

The Colorado Lottery is committed to keeping the Lottery exciting, fun and profitable for the people of Colorado. Since 1983, the Lottery has returned more than \$880 million to the state for use in parks, recreation and public facilities, and more than \$1.6 billion to players in the form of prizes.

Share the trail! Share the road!

Trail use has increased exponentially in recent years. As a result, trails can become crowded and safety can be a major issue. To be a responsible trail user, a number of trail etiquette rules have been collected. Following these rules will help reduce potential trail use conflict.

GENERAL RULES FOR ALL USERS

- Stay on existing trails.
- Don't short-cut switchbacks.
- Avoid very wet and muddy conditions.
- Do not spook horses. Move to lower side of trail if possible.
- Know the local trail rules, regulations and special concerns of the area.
- Obey gate closures and signs.
- Pass others with care. Let others know you are about to pass.
- Respect the rights of others, regardless of their mode, speed or skill level.
- Do not block the trail.
- Keep the trail clean.
- Slower traffic has right-of-way.
- Keep right, except when passing.
- Get owners' permission on private land.
- Do not disturb the wildlife.

Rules for Multi-use Trails

- Ride, skate, walk on the right. Ride, skate or walk with the flow of traffic, as far to the right side of the trail as practical.
- Ride, skate, walk single file. Don't block the trail. Groups should be in single file when other trail users are present and should never use more than one-half of the trail to allow for the flow of traffic.
- Control your speed! Obey speed regulations. Slow down and use caution when approaching or overtaking other trail users.
- Who yields the trail? Before passing another trail user, be courteous and make your approach known well in advance. A friendly greeting, "Hello, passing on your left," or ringing a bell is considerate and works well.
 - All trail users (bicyclists, skaters, walkers or others) yield to equestrians
 - Bicyclists and skaters yield to walkers
 - Bicyclists yield to skaters
 - Downhill users yield to uphill users
 - Faster users yield to slower users.

- Never spook animals.
- Leave no trace; plan ahead. Stay on existing trails and don't create any new ones. Be sure to pack out at least as much as you pack in.
- Always wear a helmet, drink plenty of water, and carry gear for changing weather conditions.



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EQUESTRIANS

- Let other users know when it's safe to pass your horse.
- Leave gates as you find them.
- Do not ride on muddy trail.
- Slow to a walk when approaching others.

MOTORIZED VEHICLES

- Travel and recreate with minimum impact.
- Travel only where motorized vehicles are permitted. Stay out of wilderness areas.
- Respect the environment and the rights of others.
- Educate yourself, plan and prepare before you go.
- Allow for future use of the outdoors, leave it better than you found it.
- Carry out your trash.
- Always properly maintain your muffler to keep noise at a minimum.
- Colorado trails can be wet and muddy both early and late in the season. Save wet trails for dryer times.

BICYCLISTS

- Ride slowly single file when passing or when being passed.
- Yield right-of-way to all other users.
- Maintain traction; skidding causes damage to the trail.
- Do not ride in the mud or on trails where ruts are created by your tires.
- Stay out of designated wilderness.
- Control your bike. Be ready to stop.
- Do not ride around waterbars.
- Downhill riders yield to uphill riders.

Rules of the Road for Bicyclists

Bicyclists have all the rights and duties applicable to the driver of any other vehicle and can be penalized for violating traffic laws.

- Ride on the right.
- Never ride against traffic.
- Ride in the right lane, except when passing another vehicle, preparing for a left turn or avoiding hazards. Always ride with the flow of traffic. Ride on the paved shoulder whenever a paved shoulder suitable for bicycle riding is present.
- Ride single file. You may ride two abreast only when no motor vehicle traffic is approaching within 300 feet (front or rear) or when all cyclists are on the shoulder. On curving canyon roads, play it safe and ride single file.
- Obey traffic laws, signs and signals.
- Use hand signals to indicate left or right turns, slowing or stopping.
- Use a headlight, tail light and reflectors at night.
- Make eye contact with drivers. Never assume motorists see you or that you have the right-of-way. Expect the unexpected; your first responsibility is to avoid a crash.

Rules of the Road for Motor Vehicles

- Scanning for pedestrians and bicyclists should be a normal part of your driving routine as is scanning for cars and trucks.
- Always yield to pedestrians.
- When passing a bicyclist:
 - Allow at least three feet between your vehicle and the bicycle
 - Be patient and wait until it is safe to pass, as you would any other slow moving vehicle
 - If you must toot your horn in advance of passing, please do it from a friendly distance (several hundred feet), not from directly behind the cyclist.
- When you are turning right and a bicyclist is proceeding straight through an intersection, do NOT speed ahead of the cyclist and cut them off as you are turning. The cyclist may not be able to avoid crashing into the passenger side of your vehicle.
