

Welcome to the Colorado OHV Program!

any exciting and beautiful areas in Colorado can be explored on an off-highway vehicle. There are motorcycle, ATV and four-wheel drive trails and roads on the plains, in the foothills and high mountain passes to challenge recreationists of all abilities.

Before heading out, owners of vehicles used for off-highway recreation need to be aware of a Colorado law administered by Colorado State Parks. It requires the registration of all terrain vehicles (ATVs), unlicensed motorcycles (dirt bikes), unlicensed four-wheel drives and dune buggies operated on public lands. (For specifics on registration, see the following page.) This law is the basis of the Colorado Off-Highway Vehicle Program, and the registration fees fund the program.

What are the reasons for the law?

- To fund trail maintenance and construction, trailheads, parking areas, trail signs and maps that would not otherwise be possible;
- To help prevent theft and enable law enforcement personnel to identify and return stolen vehicles;
- To encourage safe and responsible OHV use and promote respect for public lands; and
- To facilitate search and rescue efforts.

Who Benefits?

- Citizens who own and operate OHVs;
- Towns and counties that wish to attract OHV recreationists and tourists and enhance their local economies; and
- The general public. Educated recreationists are more conscientious and better stewards of the land. Registration funds also enable local, state and federal land managers to better manage our natural resources. Since the program started in 1990, over 12 million dollars have been granted for on-the-ground trail improvements.





The Specifics of Registration & Non-Resident Permits

All OHV owners must have a Colorado OHV registration or a non-resident OHV permit. Non-residents must buy a Colorado non-resident permit to operate an OHV in the state.

Registration

Vehicles that must be registered:

- unlicensed trail motorcycles;
- all-terrain vehicles; and
- other unlicensed, motorized recreation vehicles.
- snowmobiles are registered through a separate program.

Registration is not required for:

- motorcycles designed for use on public streets, roads and highways and carrying a current license plate;
- vehicles used strictly in mining or agriculture;
- vehicles used strictly on private land for non-commercial purposes;
- vehicles provided by a dealer for education or safety programs;
- vehicles owned by the government;
- vehicles operated in certain organized events authorized by the appropriate agency.

- Registrations are valid from April 1 through March 31.
- Non-Resident OHV Permits \$25.25

Permits

Out-of-state OHVs:

• Out-of-state residents who bring OHVs into Colorado must purchase a non-resident OHV permit to operate here. OHV non-resident permits can be purchased online at: www.parks.state.co.us/parkstore or call (303) 791-1920 for more information.

Non-Resident permits are not required for:

- Vehicles owned by the government;
- vehicles operated in certain organized events authorized by the appropriate agency;
- vehicles used on public lands for purposes other than recreation such as logging, mining or livestock grazing.

When purchasing an OHV:

- OHV dealers are required to collect the registration application and fee before a vehicle leaves their premises.
- Colorado residents who purchase an OHV from a private party may use their dated bill of sale as a temporary registration for 30 days.

Where to place your

registration:

- Registration decals must be affixed permanently on the upper forward half of the OHV, in a location where the decal can be easily seen.
- OHV operators must carry their OHV registration card and show it to any law enforcement officer upon request.

Where to Ride in Colorado

Public Lands

- Many routes and areas are open to OHVs in Colorado.
- Know before you go. Contact the local U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management or other appropriate agency office to find out about trails, roads or areas open to OHV use. Addresses and phone numbers are provided at the end of this brochure, with a map to show their location.
- All federal roads, areas and trails are categorized as open, closed or restricted in some manner. Find out what the regulations are in the area where you will be riding.
- Many public lands in Colorado border private lands. It is your responsibility to know where private lands are and to obtain permission to travel across them.
- OHVs must meet state and federal noise emission standards.

Streets, Roads and Highways

Ethics Information

You may ride on the roadways of streets and highways:

- When crossing railroad tracks, bridges or culverts;
- During any emergency declared by appropriate state or local authorities:
- Where towns & counties have authorized OHV use on roads; and
- When using an OHV for agricultural purposes.
- It is unlawful to ride on the right-of-way (the area adjacent to the shoulder of the road) of any freeway; and
- It is unlawful to ride on the right-of-way of any operating railroad except to make a right-angle crossing of the tracks at their intersection with a road or highway, or unless otherwise approved.

Law Enforcement

 This registration is enforced by all law enforcement officers in the state including sheriff's deputies, Division of Wildlife officers, Colorado State Parks officers, Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Forest Service rangers and others.

Necessary Equipment for SOUNG OHV Operation

- OHVs operated between sunset and sunrise must have at least one operating headlight and one operating red tail light.
- Operable brakes and a muffler.
- A U.S. Forest Service approved spark arrester is required for use on any public lands.
- Follow manufacturers' age and operational restrictions for ATVs.
- Use of a helmet, eye protection and other appropriate safety equipment is highly recommended.

What Can I Do to Help?

Preserve your right to ride. Help to protect the trails you ride. You can make a difference by riding safely and responsibly.

Safety considerations

- Plan ahead. Colorado has a variety of terrain and climates.
 The weather can change rapidly. Carry all necessary supplies including an emergency repair kit, food, water and warm clothing.
- Develop a supply check list, to include the above items and other equipment such as area maps and guides, protective gear, flashlight, sunscreen, etc.
- Know what to wear for your sport. Quality helmets, gloves, boots, goggles and protective clothing will keep you comfortable and help prevent serious injuries.
- Know your vehicle. Keep it in good condition and read the owner's manual.
- Let someone know where you're going and when you expect to return.
- Travel with other people.
- Know what to do in an emergency.
- For safety or training information, contact the ATV Safety Institute at 1-800-887-2887 or MSF Dirt Bike School at 1-877-288-7093.
- Colorado law requires reporting of accidents if property damage reaches \$1,500 or more or there are injuries resulting in hospitalization or death.

Reports may be filed with the Colorado State Patrol, the sheriff's office in the county of the accident or the police within the municipality of the accident.



Noxious weeds are becoming a bigger problem in Colorado! As they spread, they can:

- degrade wildlife habitat by crowding out native vegetation;
- cause increased soil erosion;
- decrease water quality;
- lower land values;
- poison wildlife, livestock and humans;
- cost millions of taxpayer and private landowner dollars to control them;
- clog or foul rivers and irrigation ditches.

Sometimes these noxious weeds are unknowingly spread by people who have no intention of causing these problems. This can easily occur when motor vehicles are driven through a patch of noxious weeds. Weed seeds can be caught in tire treads, picked up in mud, be lodged in the radiator or the underside of the vehicle and, later, fall off in some other location, starting a new infestation.

This is where we need your help. By thoroughly washing your OHVs and transport trailers before and after a ride, you will help prevent the noxious weeds from spreading.
