# Homeless and Runaway Youth in Colorado FACT SHEET

# **Background**

Too many Colorado youth have been left to fend for themselves, without a safe and stable place to stay. Between 1200 and 1500 youth and young adults ages 12 to 24 are homeless in Colorado right now<sup>i</sup>.


The National Runaway Switchboard, a federally designated communication and support center for homeless and runaway youth, operates a 24-hour crisis hotline. Callers to this hotline who are under the age of 12 have increased by 172 percent since 2000 and callers between the ages of 12 and 13 have increased substantially as well<sup>ii</sup>.

Homeless and runaway youth face unbelievable circumstances and obstacles in their lives. Youth homelessness is largely a **reflection of family breakdown**. Homeless youth often **flee homes where they experience physical, sexual, or emotional abuse**. Other key factors include parental substance abuse or mental health issues. Family conflict surrounding the sexual orientation, parenting status, or disability status of the young person is also common.

#### **Risk Factors**

Youth on their own are at great risk for further victimization and exploitation. Thirty percent of homeless youth will be actively recruited for the purposes of sexual exploitation and other forms of human trafficking within 48 hours of leaving home. Colorado is situated along a key domestic sex trafficking route<sup>iii</sup>. Youth on their own operate in survival mode and experience negative outcomes in the areas of health, education, and work force. Without prevention and early intervention, these youth are not likely to transition successfully to adulthood. Instead these youth are at high risk for HIV infection, suicide, incarceration, dropping out of school, teen parenting, and system dependence<sup>iv</sup>.

# **Making a Difference**

Advocates are working hard on this issue, but your help is needed. Several years ago, the **Colorado** legislature passed the Homeless Youth Services Act, which created the Office of Homeless Youth Services to coordinate current services, identify gaps in services and systemic issues, and to facilitate a coordinated response to the issues.

In response to the legislative intent, the Colorado Homeless Youth Action Plan was developed and is currently being implemented in order to prevent and address youth homelessness in Colorado and to ensure that the primary objectives outlined in the Homeless Youth Services Act are accomplished. Other state and local efforts are represented in this work, however local champions are needed to further this work through volunteering, donating, and organizing in communities across the state.

## November 2008 is Colorado Homeless and Runaway Youth Awareness Month

Activities will be executed to raise awareness of the issue and to provide opportunities for community involvement.

A statewide kickoff event is scheduled on November 6, 2008. All month, various local youth service agencies are planning activities for youth and open houses for community members. During the last week of the month, local community groups are encouraged to plan donation drives, volunteer recruitment activities or other awareness raising activities to benefit local youth serving organizations.
