PREFACE

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (USDHS) Preparedness Directorate's Office of Grants and Training (G&T) requires that every State and Urban Area conduct a Multiyear Training and Exercise Plan Workshop (TEPW) annually. In order to meet this requirement, Colorado recently conducted its TEPW on November 17th, 2009, and has since produced the Multiyear Training and Exercise Plan (TEP) outlined in this report.

The Colorado Multiyear TEP is the roadmap for the State of Colorado to accomplish the priorities described in the Colorado Homeland Security Strategy. The State of Colorado has pursued a coordinated homeland security strategy that combines enhanced planning, new equipment purchases, innovative training, and realistic exercises to strengthen Colorado's emergency preparedness and response capabilities. Training and exercises play a crucial role in this strategy by providing Colorado with a means of attaining, practicing, validating, and improving new and existing capabilities. This plan will be updated on an annual basis after the State Improvement Planning Workshop and State Training and Exercise Plan Workshop.

The State's training and exercise programs are coordinated and administered through the Colorado Governor's Office of Homeland Security, in coordination with other state agency emergency preparedness and homeland security programs. The training and exercise activities designated in the schedule will be directly linked to the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) funds. **(Any HSGP funds requested for training and exercise activities must align with the priorities identified in this document and must be indicated on the multiyear schedule.)**

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PURPOSE

The purpose of the Multiyear Training and Exercise Plan (TEP) is to provide a follow-on companion document to the Colorado Homeland Security Strategy and the priorities set by the State Improvement Planning Workshop. It is a living document that will be updated and refined annually. The Multiyear TEP provides a roadmap for Colorado to follow in accomplishing the priorities described in the Homeland Security Strategy through effective trainings and exercises. In addition to supporting the national priorities, the Colorado State Homeland Security Strategy outlines the following state priorities regarding training and exercise:

- Improve training systems to ensure standards for all capabilities are met in a timely and coordinated manner;
- Improve exercise planning, scheduling, execution, and evaluation activities.

Each priority target capability set by the State corresponds to a National Priority, and, where applicable, an Improvement Plan (IP) action from the previous year's After Action Review. Additionally, national planning scenarios were also prioritized after the State Improvement Planning Workshop. The State priority planning scenarios are: Pandemic Influenza and Improvise Explosive Device (IED). In addition, the nine all-hazards regions were asked to prioritize a list of four planning scenarios in order to focus their capabilities-based planning, training and exercise efforts.

Included in the Multiyear TEP is the training and exercise schedule, which provides graphic illustration of the proposed training and exercise activities scheduled for the years 2010-2012. It is representative of the natural progression of training and exercises that should take place in accordance with the building-block approach. These activities will help our state close the gaps in our capabilities and make Colorado a safer place. Lastly, this schedule should be used to deconflict schedules and share resources among regions and agencies. This year, in addition to the multiyear schedule, a draft schedule of events for a statewide exercise in 2013 has been included. This topic was discussed at the State TEPW; this schedule will be reviewed and refined in the coming months and deconflicted with other activities scheduled on the multiyear schedule.

A key part of the State Training and Exercise Plan Workshop is to deconflict and coordinate our training and exercise activities. At this time it is not possible to do so, as very few regions or agencies have multi-year calendars of their own. Going forward, any all-hazards region receiving training or exercise funds through the HSGP will be required to conduct one TEPW per calendar year. All regions should have their TEPW conducted prior to next year's State TEPW so that calendar deconfliction and coordination may occur. State agencies are also encouraged to do the same.

PROGRAM PRIORITIES

NATIONAL PRIORITIES

The eight national priorities guide the nation's preparedness efforts to meet the most urgent needs. Colorado has drafted its strategy, goals, and objectives in order to meet these priorities. In addition to the national priorities, the State of Colorado has adopted three additional priorities:

- Ensure the sustainability of Homeland Security programs by gaining state elected officials' support;
- Improve training systems to ensure standards for all capabilities are met in a timely and coordinated manner;
- Improve exercise planning, scheduling, execution, and evaluation activities.

In the fall of 2008, the State Training and Exercise Program Manager was hired in the Governor's Office of Homeland Security in order to address the latter two state priorities. This position is responsible for providing technical assistance to the nine (sub-state) all-hazards emergency management regions for training, exercises (including HSEEP), and program management. Additionally, this Program Manager is responsible for conducting the State Training and Exercise Plan Workshop as well as drafting and updating the State Multi-Year Training and Exercise Plan.

What follows is a brief explanation of capabilities-based planning efforts currently occurring in the State of Colorado which address the eight national priorities (*State Preparedness Report, Version 12/15/08*):

Expand Regional Collaboration

Intra-state regional collaboration has been a focus in Colorado since 2003. The nine All-Hazards Regions were created by the Governor in 2003 to bring together Colorado first responders, emergency management, public health, agriculture, and local leaders to collaborate in the prevention, protection, response and recovery from domestic incidents— both manmade and natural. This collaborative all-hazards model enables the state and local agencies to work together to provide integrated and cooperative emergency services to the citizens of Colorado. Collaboration among the regions provides a cost effective way to build capabilities within the state by strategically locating shared regional resources, as well as conducting regional training and exercises.

Implement NIMS and the National Response Framework

The NIMSCAST tool has been adopted and implemented as a means to monitor NIMS compliance. The State of Colorado is at 100% NIMS compliance for all required activities and affirmative

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responses to the associated performance measurement metrics. A Statewide NIMS Committee that oversees overall NIMS implementation requirements and activities has begun efforts to collaborate with regional FEMA states. The use of the Incident Command System (ICS) has increased at the state level and is being incorporated in every exercise and response effort at the local level.

Implement the National Infrastructure Protection Plan

The NIPP is a multi-faceted approach created by presidential directive to assist states in protecting critical infrastructure and key resources. The Rubicon team is the critical infrastructure protection team that serves as the State's primary point of contact for implementation of the NIPP. The Rubicon team just completed the inaugural training of the CAPTAP/ACAMS product from DHS. This product allows a standardized, DHS supported portal to gather critical first responder information and prioritize Colorado's assets. The Rubicon team continues to provide "All hazards" risk assessments for the state's critical infrastructure.

Strengthen Information Sharing and Collaboration Capabilities

The Colorado Information Analysis Center (CIAC) was designed as the state's fusion center to create cross-jurisdictional partnerships between local, state and federal agencies, including private sector participants. It provides one central point for the collection, analysis and timely dissemination of all-hazards information for the protection of citizens and critical infrastructure. The CIAC also acts as an early warning system for actual or suspected terrorist acts, natural disasters and criminal activities and helps to facilitate comprehensive protection strategies and unified response tactics. In July, 2007, the CIAC launched a Terrorism Liaison Officer (TLO) Program for law enforcement and first responder agencies through the state to strengthen information sharing and to enhance multi-jurisdictional partnerships.

Strengthen Interoperable and Operable Communications Capabilities

Capability levels for communications have ranged from 2.31 to 2.64 on the Woodbury Scale, meaning between initial efforts to moderate progress has been made on this capability. Colorado has made significant progress using Homeland Security and other grant funding sources to strengthen this capability. The state communications capability operates on a "system of systems." The Statewide Digital Trunked Radio System (DTRS) provides interoperability coverage to over 700 multi-disciplinary agencies and approximately 32,000 users, representing state, federal, Tribal and local government agencies.

Strengthen CBRNE Detection, Response, and Decontamination Capabilities

Capability levels for this priority have increased each year during statewide self-assessments. Moderate progress towards achieving desired capability levels were assessed for the

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WMD/Hazardous Materials Response and Decontamination, and Explosive Device Response Operations capabilities, while initial efforts have begun for the CBRNE Detection capability. There are personnel within the state who have received weapons of mass destruction (WMD) awareness level training. These personnel are trained to inspect buildings and special events for building or fire code compliance, as well as personnel assigned to commercial vehicle safety compliance activities.

Strengthen Medical Surge and Mass Prophylaxis Capabilities

Statewide capability self-assessment scores over the past three years have measured these capabilities at between initial efforts and moderate progress in achieving desired capability levels. In 2007, Colorado received a 90% score on its technical assistance review of its Strategic National Stockpile (SNS), ranking its program in the top 20-25% of all States and territories participating in the DSNS. Exercises in the Denver metro area have been conducted to test mass prophylaxis capabilities for responders. The Colorado Department of Public Health stood up the Colorado Public Health and Medical Volunteer System as a web-based management tool for meeting the requirements of HHS to develop an emergency system for Advance Registration of Volunteer Health Professionals. There are currently close to 700 volunteers in the database. Future resources required to strengthen these capabilities will be needed, particularly for planning, training and exercise activities, equipment such as radios and PPE for medical personnel, and medical surge and mass prophylaxis supplies.

Strengthen Planning and Citizen Preparedness Capabilities

The State's current self-assessment of its Citizen Preparedness Capability rates it at initial efforts and resources underway to achieve the output. There are regional Citizen Corps Councils throughout the state. All five component programs of Citizen Corps are currently active, with future emphasis being placed on enhancing that capacity. The READYColorado program promotes disaster preparedness throughout the state. In terms of its Planning Capability, the state's selfassessment indicates moderate progress towards achieving its desired level of capability. Future resources required to strengthen these capabilities will be needed, particularly for staffing maintenance (planners, Citizen Corps and READYColorado), training for volunteers, training and exercises for plans, and maintenance of current programs (READYColorado and ROSS).

PRIORITY TARGET CAPABILITIES

In October 2009, the Governor's Office of Homeland Security held the State Improvement Planning Workshop. This workshop included appropriate federal, state, tribal, regional (sub-state), and local stakeholders involved in assisting Colorado in addressing the State Homeland Security Strategy. Included in these stakeholders were State Goal Leaders which represent one of 38

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capability objectives within the 5 goal areas in the Strategy. (*See the Colorado State Homeland Security Strategy, p. 13-22.*) It was determined that Colorado would maintain the priority list of 15 target capabilities established for the 2008 Improvement Planning Workshop and associated homeland security grant cycle.

These priority target capabilities provide an area of focus for capabilities-based planning, training and exercise activities. These capability areas will be reviewed on an annual basis at the State Improvement Planning Workshop in conjunction with regional capability assessments, threat & risk assessments, the homeland security grant program and past after-action reports & improvement plans for both exercises and real-world events. As the priority target capabilities for the 2009 and 2010 Colorado Homeland Security Grant Programs, applications must be associated with these capabilities to be eligible for funding. *(See grant guidance for specific detail regarding funding eligibility.)*

The priority 15 target capabilities are:

- Planning
- Communications
- Community Preparedness & Participation
- Intelligence and Information Sharing and Dissemination
- Responder Safety & Health
- Critical Infrastructure Protection
- Counter-Terror Investigations and Law Enforcement

- CBRNE Detection
- Explosive Device Response Operations

- Citizen Evacuation and Shelter-in-Place
- Emergency Public Information & Warning
- Medical Surge
- Mass Prophylaxis
- Mass Care

The following information outlines the training and exercise activities that support each of the priority 15 target capabilities. PLANNING SCENARIO PRIORITIES

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security has developed 15 national planning scenarios for use in national, federal, state, tribal, and local homeland security preparedness activities. These scenarios are designed to be the foundational structure for the development of national preparedness standards from which homeland security capabilities can be measured. The only scenario which would not directly impact Colorado is the threat of a major hurricane. Under the Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC) however, Colorado capabilities might be deployed in support of hurricane operations in another state or could be affected by evacuation and re-location efforts. It was determined after the State Improvement Planning Workshop that Colroado would select two priority planning scenarios for the 2010 Colorado Homeland Security Program. They are: **Pandemic Influenza and Improvised Explosive Device**. In addition, each all-hazards region was asked to prioritize 4 planning scenarios (national or state) based on the threats and risks unique to their area of the state. This list should be used to prioritize capabilities-based planning, training and exercise activities in their region. Additionally, this scenario prioritization *may* be included in the homeland security grant program project eligibility guidelines.

- 1. Improvised nuclear device
- 2. Aerosol anthrax
- 3. Pandemic influenza
- 4. Plague
- 5. Blister agent
- 6. Toxic industrial chemicals
- 7. Nerve agent
- 8. Chlorine tank explosion

- 9. Major earthquake
- 10. Major hurricane
- 11. Radiological dispersal device
- 12. Improvised explosive device
- 13. Food contamination
- 14. Foreign animal disease
- 15. Cyber attack

In November 2007, a group of statewide stakeholders identified an additional set of scenarios that should be considered in developing state preparedness standards. These threats are considered in addition to those identified in the national planning scenarios and are unique to Colorado.

- Major wild-land fire
- Major snow storm/blizzard

- Large scale civil disobedience

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- Coordinated and simultaneous terrorist attacks on multiple targets
- Major tornado

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METHODOLOGY AND EVENT TRACKING

The Governor's Office of Homeland Security requires that all local, regional, tribal and state exercises funded through the State Homeland Security Grant Program be designed, conducted and evaluated in accordance with the Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP). HSEEP is the national standard for exercise implementation and evaluation, and as such, the State of Colorado has adopted HSEEP as the state standard.

Exercises should be designed so that each one increases in complexity and scope from the previous. Additionally, trainings and exercise should use a cyclical approach. Once a plan, policy or procedure has been developed, training is provided, the plan is exercised, and the corrective actions and lessons learned are documented. The plan, policy or procedure is then updated based upon gaps identified in the exercise. Then the cycle begins again. Using the building block approach ensures a successful progression in exercise complexity and allows for the appropriate training and preparation to occur prior to participation in exercises.

A state-wide exercise After Action Review will take place each year prior to the annual State Improvement Planning Workshop. This review will compile the capabilities tested, scenarios used, lessons learned, recommendations and improvement plans from the previous year's exercise and real world after action reports. This information will be used to not only review and/or update the State Priorities, it will also be used at the State TEPW to review and/or update the State Training and Exercise Schedule. In addition to the statewide exercise After Action Review, each region should be conducting a review of their own prior to the regional TEPW. The information TRAIN is comprised of the national www.train.org site and gathered should allow them the opportunity to review and/or update their own training and exercise priorities and schedules.

CO.TRAIN

For many years, agencies across the state have been using different and disparate training management systems to implement, deliver and track training and exercise programs. In an effort to facilitate statewide collaboration, the Emergency Preparedness and Response Division of CDPHE and GOHS have decided to take the existing CO.TRAIN program and change the functionality of current features within the program that will make use of the program more efficient and widespread across the State. Currently CO.TRAIN is utilized by state and local public health, environmental health and the medical communities. The changes would

For the State of Colorado, the **Colorado Department of Public** Health and Environment manages the Colorado TRAIN affiliate site. This site is used as a learning and training management system which includes course administration, scheduling, calendaring and tracking.

provide functionality for other training and exercise programs to use CO.TRAIN including those from

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other disciplines; such as, homeland security, emergency management, and law enforcement. Implementation of the "new" system is expected early in 2010. By spring of 2010, the majority of state agencies and regional homeland security and emergency preparedness programs will be utilizing CO.TRAIN.



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STATEWIDE EXERCISE 2013 - PROPOSAL

The State Training & Exercise Program would like to propose a statewide exercise for March 2013. The date was chosen so as to not conflict with any agency or region that has multi-year training and exercise calendars through 2012. The current state planning scenarios are pandemic influenza and improved explosive device (IED); due to the extensive real world incidents revolving around pandemic influenza, it was decided that the statewide exercise should utilize the IED planning scenario. It has been proposed that the state request planning support for the exercise through the Regional Exercise Support Program and utilize training and exercise funds through the homeland security grant program.

During the State TEPW a draft timeline of activities, utilizing the building block approach, was provided to participants. These activities and any others that may be scheduled should be coordinated with local priorities and activities and widespread participation from the all-hazards regions and state agencies is expected. Each of the tables at the TEPW was asked to complete the statewide exercise worksheet. This document was a planning tool to determine whether the state will be prepared to participate in such an exercise. Participants were asked to determine plans, recourses, training and exercise needs for the statewide exercise. The information in these worksheets will be compiled and sent out statewide for additional feedback. After discussions with the applicable goal leaders and program managers within GOHS, more information will be passed along regarding the conduct of a statewide exercise. Many factors will be taken into account prior to making the final decision regarding the exercise such as, real world events, timeline, grant funds, etc. The draft timeline of activities may be found at the end of this document.

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MULTIYEAR TRAINING AND EXERCISE SCHEDULE

The following is the State Multi-Year Training and Exercise Schedule. The purpose of this schedule is to provide program managers/leads with a graphic illustration of the training and exercise activities occurring from 2009-2011. This schedule should be used to deconflict schedules across jurisdictions/regions/agencies, as well as coordinate activities to ensure non-duplicative efforts and resource sharing.

Training and exercise activities listed on this schedule are regional, multi-regional, state and federal level only. For local training and exercise activities, please refer to the appropriate Regional Multi-year Training and Exercise schedules.
