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What is business identity theft?

Business identity theft is a relatively new development in identity theft. In the case of a business, a criminal "hijacks" a business' identity and uses that identity, and the business' good credit history, to establish lines of credit with banks or retailers. Using this credit, the identity thief purchases goods, gift cards, and other items that can be bought and exchanged for cash or sold with relative ease.

The damage can be devastating to the victimized business. The damage to the victim's credit history can lead to denial of credit, which can lead to operational problems. The cost to clean-up and correct the damage can be hundreds of dollars and hours of lost time.

What can a business do?

This pamphlet and other materials were created to help businesses reduce the threat and to help those businesses that have already fallen victim to these crimes.

Protect Your Business

Take the following initial steps to protect your business from business identity theft:

- Subscribe to the Secretary of State's e-mail notification services.
- Sign up for Secure Business Filing at the Secretary of State.
- Obtain a commercial credit report for your business.
- Sign up for electronic notifications with your bank, other creditors, and service providers.

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Victims of Business Identity Theft

If you believe your business is a victim of business identity theft, you should immediately take the following steps to begin the recovery process:

- Report the theft to your local law enforcement agency.
- Contact all of your business' banks or credit providers and report the theft.
- Contact the largest credit reporting agencies and speak with the Fraud Department to report the crime and view your business credit report.
