

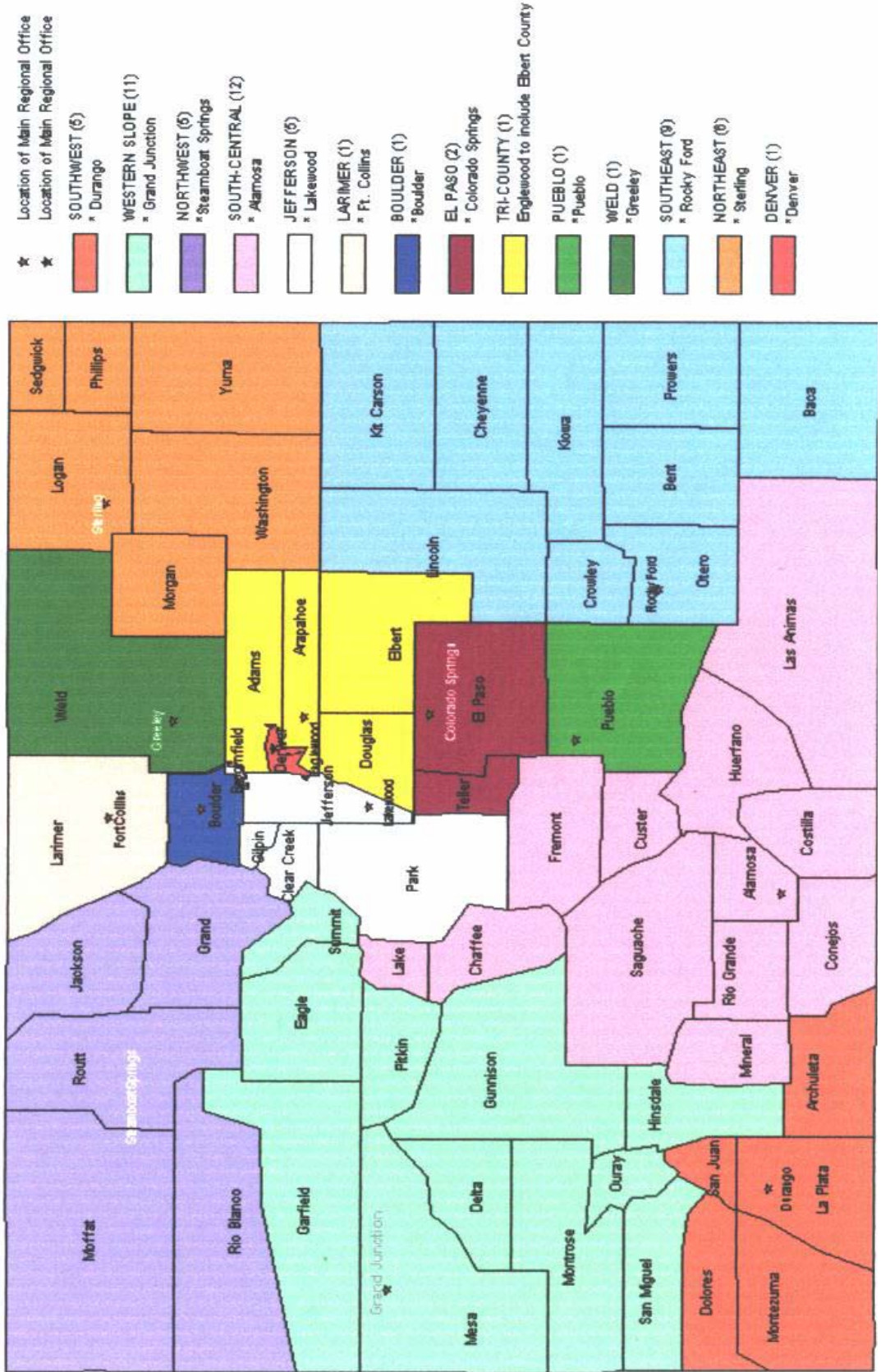

## SUMMARY

Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs are those who have or are at increased risk for a chronic physical, developmental, behavioral, or emotional condition and who also require health and related services of a type or amount beyond that required by children generally. Currently there are approximately 225,000 children and youth in Colorado under 22 years of age who meet this definition<sup>1</sup>.

In 2001, the Maternal and Child Health Bureau established six national outcome measures to build a comprehensive coordinated system of care for Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs (next page). The Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs Unit at the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment addresses these outcome measures through four programs: the Medical Home Initiative, the newborn screening and identification program, integrated data system and the Health Care Program for Children with Special Needs (HCP).

HCP is a network of 14 regional offices and three health departments who serve all 64 counties in Colorado. Through local activities HCP builds local comprehensive coordinated systems of care for Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs.

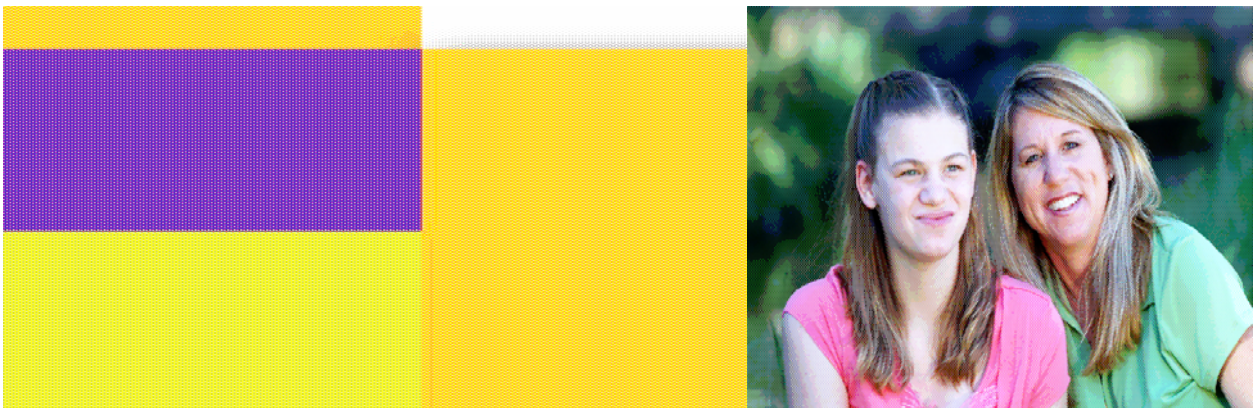
The purpose of this report is to describe the health and well being of Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs and provide data regarding children and youth served by the programs in the Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs Unit at the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. This report is organized by topic area and includes demographic information on Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs, the status of health and risk factors for special health care needs, utilization of services and HCP activities for this population. A broad range of data are used to provide as in-depth look at the health of this population. Data sources include, U.S. Census data, newborn hearing screening data, data from the Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs Unit (NEST) data system, and the Colorado Child Health Survey. These data will be provided in four volumes.

Volume 1 is prepared to assist the HCP program regional offices with assessment and evaluation of their activities to meet the six outcome measures. This report is also a stand-alone document that provides public health professionals, partners, community members, and the general public with a report on the health of Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs in Colorado.

# OUTCOME MEASURES

Families of Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs will partner in decision making at all levels, and will be satisfied with the services they receive.

1. All Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs will receive coordination on-going comprehensive care within a medical home.
2. All families of Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs will have adequate private and/or public insurance to pay for the services they need.
3. All children will be screened early and continuously for special health care needs.
4. Community-based service systems will be organized so families can use them easily.
5. All youth with special health care needs will receive the services necessary to make transition to all aspects of adult life, including adult health care, work and independence.



## OVERVIEW OF COLORADO

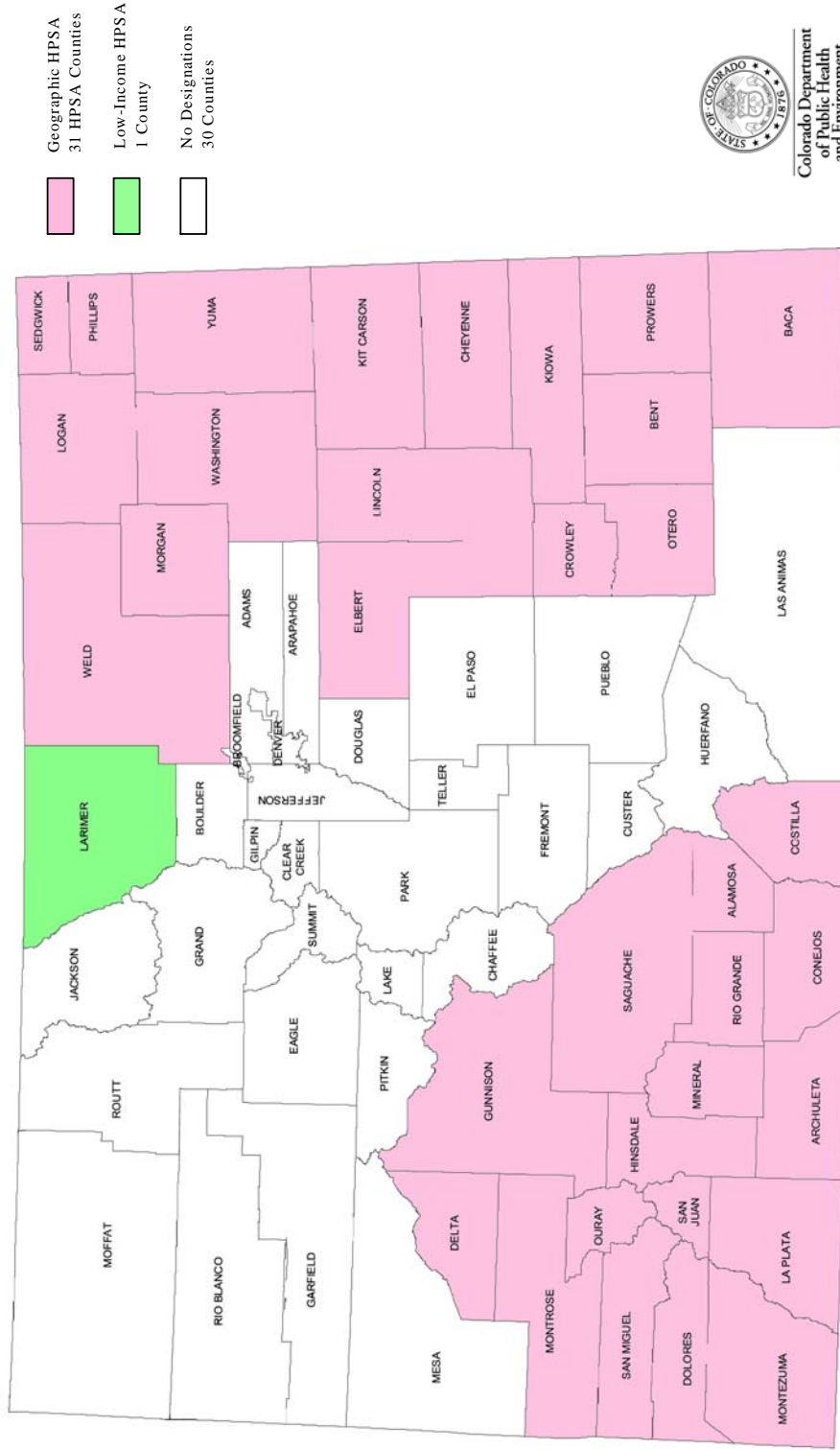
Colorado is the eighth largest state geographically. Colorado is 104,247 square miles; 387 miles from east to west and 276 miles from north to south. The eastern half of the state has high flat plains and rolling prairies that gradually rise westward to the Front Range foothills and the higher ranges of the Rocky Mountains. The Continental Divide runs from north to south through east central Colorado and bisects the state into eastern and western slopes. The western half of the state consists of alpine terrain interspersed with wide valleys, rugged canyons and high plateaus and deep basins<sup>2</sup>.

The state can be divided into five distinct regions: the Front Range, the Western Slope, the Eastern plains, the Eastern Mountains, and the San Luis Valley. Close to 82 percent of Colorado's population lives in the Front Range, which includes the metropolitan areas of Denver-Boulder, Ft. Collins, Greeley, Colorado Springs and Pueblo. The San Luis Valley in the southern part of the state is the region with the smallest population, with about 46,000 residents. Over fifteen percent of Colorado's residents are considered rural residents, living outside core urban areas<sup>3</sup>.

Much of Colorado is considered to be medically underserved with a shortage of physicians, dental providers, or mental health providers.

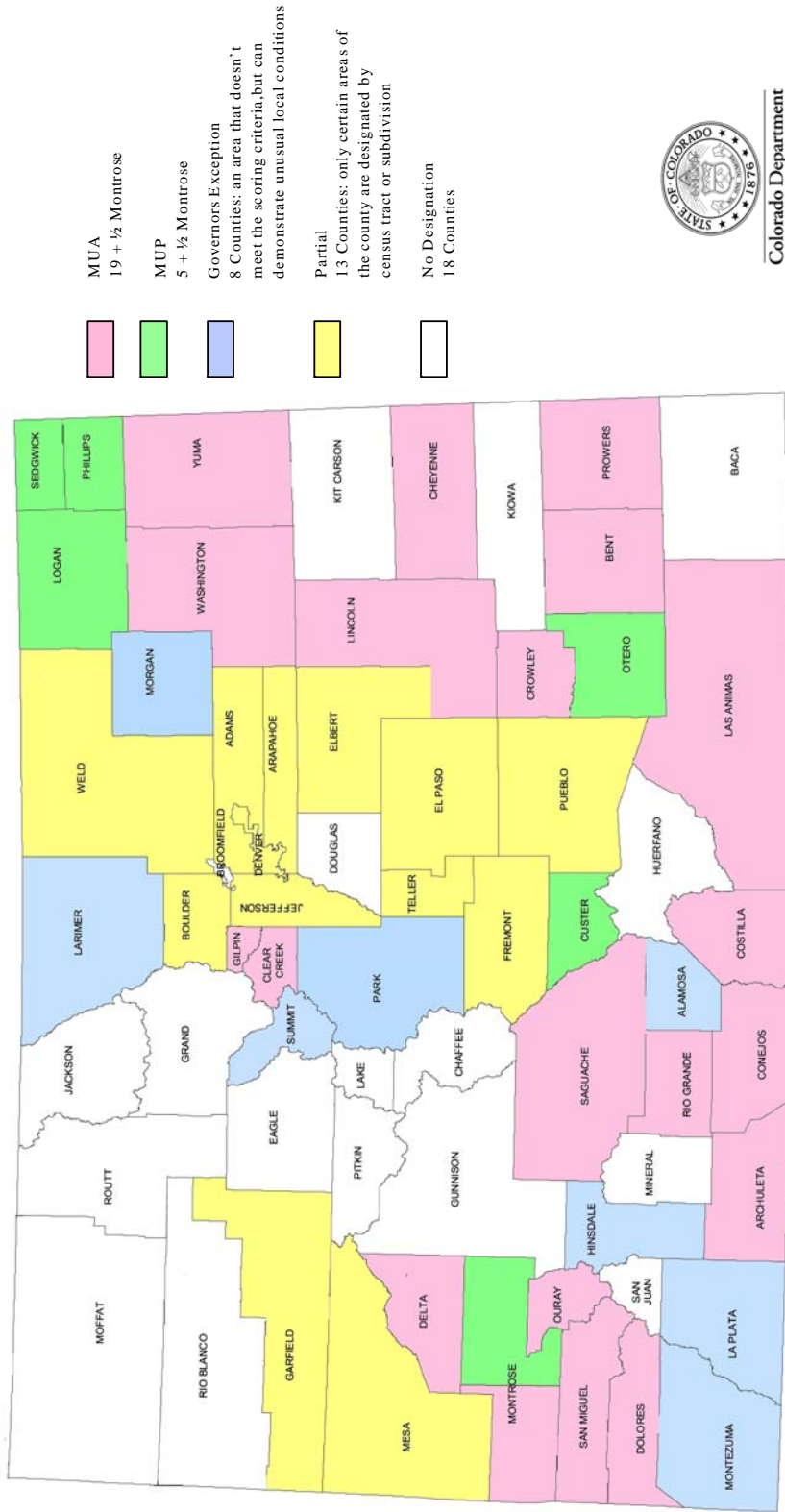

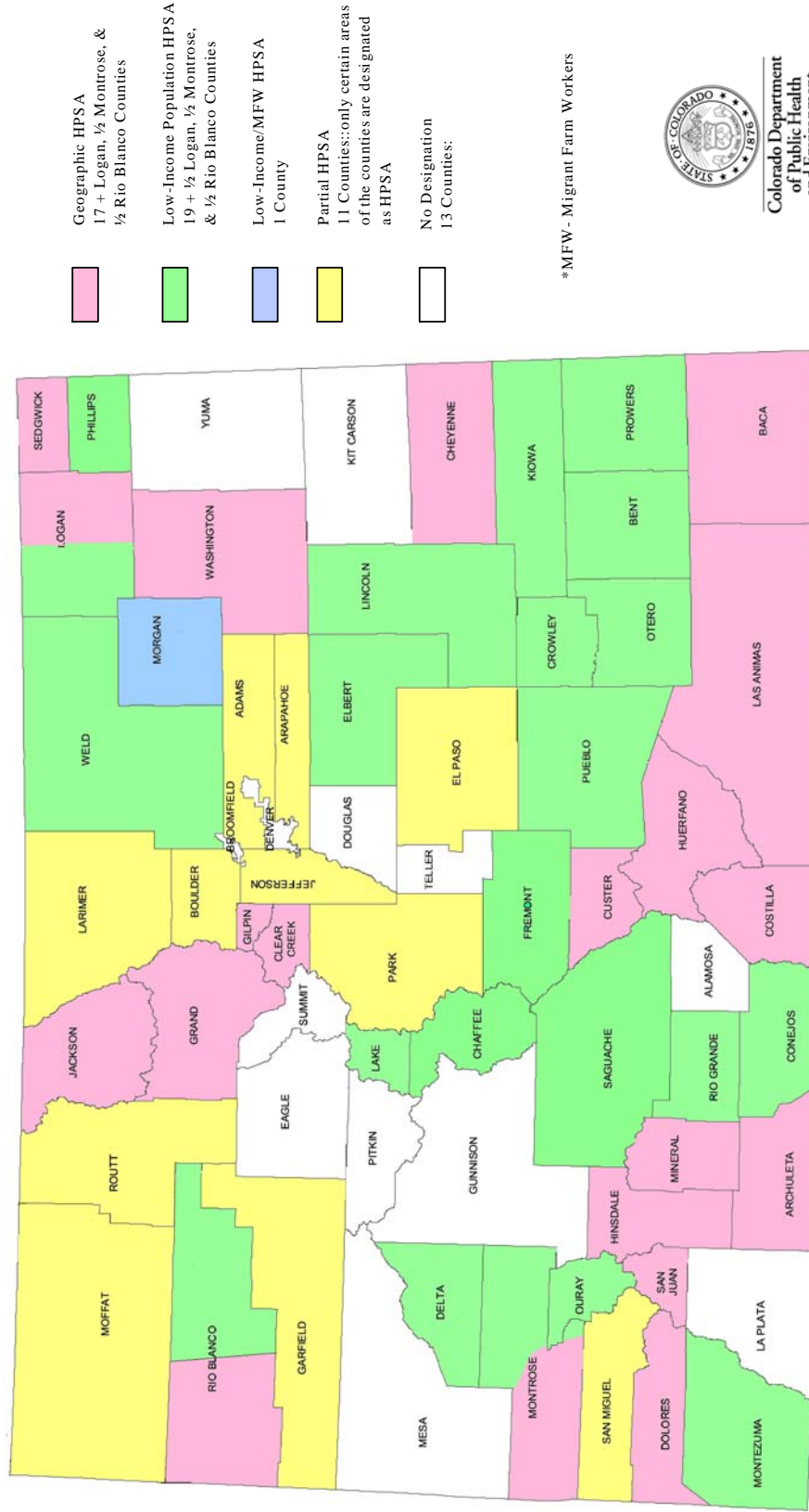

# Children with Special Health Care Needs

It is estimated that fifteen percent of all children in Colorado are children with a special health care need. In Colorado, there are an estimated 225,000 children with a special health care need.

To calculate the percent of children with Special Health Care Needs in your community multiply the population of interest by 15%. For example if you have 100,000 children under 21 in your community then you would have  $100,000 \times .15 = 15,000$  children with special health care needs in your community. This number is an estimate and not an exact count of children with special health care needs in the community.
