



Environmental Cleaning 60 Second Check

- · An Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered hospital disinfectant should be used for environmental disinfection.
 - · Manufacturer recommendations should be followed for concentration & contact time.

- · Personal protective equipment (PPE) should be worn when cleaning surfaces or equipment currently and/or previously used by another person.
- · On a daily basis, frequently touched surfaces should be cleaned and disinfected, such as:
 - · Bed tables and bed rails
 - Doorknobs
 - Countertops
 - · Sinks
- · Used cleaning solutions should be discarded, and housekeeping equipment should be rinsed and allowed to dry prior to reuse.
- · Replace dirty cloths and mop heads with clean items each time a bucket of disinfectant is emptied and replaced with fresh, clean solution.
- · Soiled linen should be handled as little as possible to prevent contamination and aerosolization of pathogens. Standard precautions should be followed when handling soiled linens.
- · When a patient has been discharged, all surfaces (horizontal and vertical) should be cleaned and disinfected.
- · Surfaces and objects should be cleaned in order from least contaminated to most contaminated (e.g., sinks and counters before toilets).
